

Summer events in and around the Chapel

Summer is a time when Speen Church members like to have fun and get outside, and the annual croquet on Stephen and Dawn Booth's lawn was an enjoyable time, matched by the very different sport of archery with the Whiteleaf Bowmen a couple of weeks later. It should be noted that the Bowmen are also very capable coaches, and even the most hesitant guests were achieving some closely-grouped clusters by the end of a (slightly rainy) evening, before heading for the White Lion.

One recent invitation that was held inside the Chapel was the ladies' breakfast on 5th July where, following Gloria Holmes' and Judy Redrup's signature salmon and scrambled eggs, speaker Josephine Biss talked about opportunities to help young people who get into trouble, through volunteering with the Youth Offending Service.



With her friend Susan also contributing, the talk drew a picture of young people with social problems and difficult family backgrounds – or none – facing the emotional pressure of questioning from police at a time when they perceive that they are on their own, and feel that they can do nothing to help themselves. Without support, they are much more likely to re-offend. Josephine told a story of one young man whose feeling of hopelessness after questioning led him to commit suicide.

Police are not allowed to question a young person aged under 17 without an appropriate adult. A parent may not be available, or willing. However,

Youth Offending Service volunteers have a unique dispensation to talk to those in custody privately.

Another side of the work is support following a magistrates' court community order, a common intervention for low-level offending which may also involve the process of restorative justice. Support broadly translates into being there for young people who are crying out for someone to love them, often the story behind their less than loving actions.

This was a memorable time, and not a few who heard the talk went away thinking about whether some of their time could be well spent making a real difference in a young person's life.

Chapel plans look good to go

The latest scheme to refurbish and slightly extend the hall of the chapel is finding more favour with authorities than previous applications. Planning officials have commented favourably on the overall design, and are satisfied that the rebuilding does not point to a significantly different pattern of use, or level of traffic and parking requirement.

A particular feature of the design is a new pedestrian entrance with a footpath and gate looking out to the village up the hill. The intention is to encourage people to walk (or cycle) to the various regular gatherings and not bring cars unless necessary.

The general appearance will match the brick and flint of the original circa-1801 chapel, and retain some of the brickwork of the 1960s extension while cloaking it with new walls which will incorporate timber cladding to soften the

appearance. Next steps are to seek formal planning permission with listed building consent – and considerable fundraising from personal and charitable sources.



Speen Village Hall

The Village Hall is 90 years old this year! I know it does not look it but the hall has been owned by the village since 1924 when it was purchased for £124. So we are celebrating by holding a cream tea party on Saturday 26th July at 3.00pm in the village hall. We may also manage a birthday cake! All are welcome and we are raising funds for the village hall roof.

During the forties and fifties the village hall was the centre of village activities with dances, whist drives, quizzes and serving as the local meeting hall. Today it has become the centre for village organisations with the Pre-School, WI, Bridge Club, Table Tennis Club and Garden Club all holding regular meetings.

However these do not provide sufficient income to cover the hall's expenses - we have experienced a 25% increase in electricity charges this year alone. We are therefore reliant on events arranged by the Village Hall Management Committee to generate additional funding and the Christmas Bazaar and the Film and Food Evenings have been particularly successful. For major extraordinary expenditure we do need external funding and we are extremely

grateful for the help we have received from the Pre-School, the Shop Charity, the Parish and District Councils and especially this year from the Fete Committee. This year we have to spend a significant sum on repairs to the roof in order to prevent further flood damage.

In previous editions of the SNDN we described what we had found out about the ten young men whose names are recorded on the WWI memorial at Speen Chapel. Recently a fellow researcher in Princes Risborough kindly sent us a copy of the Military Electoral Register for 1918. It proved to be surprisingly educational.

None of us knew, for example, that hardly any of the British soldiers who fought in WWI were able to vote. To have the right to vote you had to be male, over the age of 21 and to own Property. Few of the young men of Speen owned a house; most Speen families were tenants who lived in a house owned by their landlord. Even young but wealthy men – in 1914, they overwhelmingly constituted the Officer class – were not entitled to vote if they still lived in a family home that was owned by their Father.

When Conscription was introduced in 1916, the nation faced the unacceptable fact that British young men were being ordered to go to war by a Government over which they had no say. That cruel anomaly was clearly intolerable in a Democracy. (Interestingly, all German soldiers - and all French soldiers - had held the right to vote for many years before WWI.) It took Parliament a long time to work out a solution. In 1917, the Russian Revolution greatly sharpened the realisation that something had to be done.

The Representation of the People Act of 1918 enfranchised all men over the age of 21, provided they were not insane or felons or Members of the House of Lords. The property requirement was abolished, for men. It also gave the right to vote to women - over the age of 30 - provided they owned property or were married to a property owner. Why was that? The 1918 legislation tripled the size of the Electorate; it increased from 7.7 million people to 21.4 million - but, of those, 43% were women. So many men had been killed during WWI that, had women been enfranchised on the same basis as men, they would have been in the majority. Parliament felt that Britain was not yet ready to accept so much change.

A decade later, the Representation of the People Act of 1928 allowed women to vote at age 21, without any property restriction. Adults in the Mother Country then had the same right to vote that their kith and kin in New Zealand had enjoyed since 1893. In Germany, women had received the right to vote on 12th November 1918, the day after the end of WWI. Women in France were not eligible to vote until 1944.

Today there is concern that hundreds of thousands of young people have not bothered to put their names on the Electoral Register. The Home Office is running a campaign to urge them to do so; no such persuasion was needed in 1918. Curiously, in the late 1970s, the personnel staff at MOD discovered that a great many noncommissioned ranks thought it was somehow improper for them to be associated with politics and therefore they did not vote. In recent years, a Parliamentary Committee has criticised the Army for failing to make adequate administrative arrangements for those fighting in Afghanistan to exercise their right to vote. Evidently, there are some things that the Army did better in 1918.

Our studies of the 1918 Electoral Roll were interesting. Then as now, Speen, Lacey Green and Loosley Row were in the same electoral district. Forty-one servicemen gave their home address as Speen, Flowers Bottom, Turnip End, Darvills Hill or "Speen Bottom" which, today, is Highwood Bottom. The list included Frank Randall who was killed on 25th March 1918 and Artie Ralph Bristow who was to die, his health broken, in 1920. It also listed Corporal John Rixon who was killed on 26th August 1918 and his brother William, who survived the War - but it gives their address as Lacey Green. Since we knew that they lived in Speen, we added the Rixon brothers into the total of 41 but, clearly, there may be more Speen men concealed under other addresses.

The big families of Speen were well represented; there were five Ridgley's; four Janes' and four Bristow's. There was just one officer; Wilfred Warren of Turnip End was a 2nd Lt in the 8th Sherwood Foresters. Nine men were in the Ox & Bucks; of those, one – Harry Saunders - was a Corporal, the remainder were Privates. Nine men

from Speen were Privates in the Labour Corps, or its equivalent (Archibald Ridgley was a Private in the Agricultural Corps; Albert Frederick Ward was a Sapper in the Royal Engineers) and they would have had a mixed experience of the War. They were employed to dig trenches, under fire, but they also manned the regimental baths; laundries; cinemas etc for the troops who were periodically withdrawn from the Front and brought back to the safety of a Depot for a period of recuperation. Sidney Albert Janes - always known as Albert - a pillar of the Speen Cricket Club (his son, Brian would captain High Wycombe and also Bucks) was a Private in the 3rd Cavalry Reserve. Most of them, lucky men, were never called to the Front; they were held - in reserve – to train replacements for those cavalry regiments that were on active service. Nevertheless, towards the end of the War, a few of them had to be converted into infantry to meet the manpower demands of trench warfare.

Walter Fred Linzell, of The White House, was a Lance Corporal in the 67th Cycling Company. Cyclists were employed on reconnaissance and communications work; one bicycle required far less support than one horse. Similarly, Privates Rowland Ridgley and Laurence John Vosper were new-fangled motor transport drivers in the Army Service Corps. Three men, Corporal Archibald Charles Bristow, his tragic young cousin Private Artie Bristow and Private Walter Gomme, were in the Machine Gun Corps. Machine guns - and the gunnery observation balloons operated by the Royal Flying Corps - were always priority targets and men in those corps suffered the Army's highest casualty rates. Private Henry William Holman served in the Royal Field Artillery; that was the largest element of the Royal Artillery and it operated howitzers and medium calibre guns close to the front line. Privates Arthur Atkins and Harry Ridgley and Platoon Bombardier William Rixon were in the Royal Garrison Artillery; they fired the Army's huge siege guns that ultimately defeated the Germans despite their deep, concrete, bunkers. Being difficult to manoeuvre, the heavy artillery were positioned so far behind the front line that they relied on the spotter planes of the Royal Flying Corps to report, by morse code, the fall of the shot. Two Speen men, Privates William Charles Brown and Alfred Lovett, found themselves – like Private Edward Lester Janes, who had been killed in April 1918 - in the Royal Marines Light Infantry; Britain was so desperate for men that the Navy had to provide infantry for the trenches. Alfred Lovett gave his address as The King William.

There were three Speen men serving at sea in the Royal Navy: Harold Stanley Austin, Leslie Walter Austin and Harry Dean. The Austin brothers gave their address as "Peter Hill, Speen". Does anyone know where that is? Harold Stanley was serving in HMS Ambrose, a substantial cargo liner that was converted into an armed merchant cruiser and

later served as a Depot ship for submarines. WWI submarines were small and could not carry large amounts of food, fuel or, indeed, torpedoes. Unlike today's nuclear-powered submarines, they had to be regularly re-supplied; the Germans called their equivalents "mother ships". The Ambrose had workshops that could carry out repairs for the submarines and also provided cabins for relief crews. Harold's brother, Leslie Walter, served in HMS Colossus a huge "Dreadnought" battleship that fought at the Battle of Jutland in 1916 and sank the German cruiser Weisbaden. Colossus was the flagship of the First Battle Squadron under the command of Capt Dudley Pound. Although a sick man (he had a brain tumour that ultimately affected his judgment) he was later appointed First Sea Lord for the first four years of WWII. Today,

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
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Speen Pre-School

Another School Year Comes to an End

Although the summer term still has another couple of weeks to run with plenty more exciting events to fit in such as the annual Sports Morning and Ploughman's Lunch and end of year parties for both parents and children, we have already had a summer term packed with activities.

Many of these have been held jointly with Speen School, with whom we continue to work closely. This year we have joined the school for story time, staff have observed phonics lessons and we held a joint trip to see 'What the Ladybird Heard' at the Wycombe Swan – the highlight for many being the trip in a coach! Each half-term we have been visited by Jo Jingles for singing and instrument playing – a morning which is always popular with the children.

More recently we have been involved in the Speenfest activities. The space theme began with a visit by Mad Science – a team of scientists encouraging children to engage with science through watching and taking part in experiments. This was followed by a visit to Speen School for a day of arts, crafts, poems and music all with a space theme. Back at base station – the village hall – the children have dressed as astronauts, made rockets and even eaten space ice-cream!

The space theme was adopted for the Stargazer's Ball and this year the pre-school were involved in organising this event, which proved a very popular and enjoyable evening. 40% of funds raised will be going towards the pre-school and this money will be used for some much needed technology items.

Thank you for all your support with pre-school fundraisers throughout the year. We are a thriving pre-school but with Speen not being a through route to anywhere we can struggle to fill places. Fundraising and the grants recently received from the Speen Shop charity enable us to buy new equipment and fund staff training. We have also embarked on our first marketing campaign to introduce our pre-school to a wider audience.

We have spaces available for September onwards. We take children from two upwards and offer a range of hours including our core 9 – 12 morning sessions as well as lunch clubs and afternoon sessions. Butchers

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Light lunches are served daily and include fresh salads, sandwiches and filled rolls. Bacon sandwiches, burgers in buns, ice cream sundaes, homemade cakes and brownies are available all day with freshly ground coffee and a selection of teas.

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Wildlife Watch

The winter of 2013/14 passed without any prolonged hard conditions so fewer winter birds visited local gardens than usual. One of the best birds of the winter was a Mealy Redpoll in March kindly reported by Margaret Lewis. This is significantly rarer than the Lesser Redpolls that visit some gardens in good numbers. This must be the third year in the last four that at least one of these birds has been present either in our garden or in Woodview Drive. Prior to this, 11 Črossbills were recorded at Redland End in mid January. Siskins were also present and interestingly two were still feeding in our own garden in mid May, suggesting that they may have remained in the county to breed rather than migrating north again. Bullfinches have also been increasingly regular visitors to our garden with six present at the feeders on one occasion.

On the northern side of Speen a pair of Ravens have been investigating potential nest sites whilst Jackdaws have certainly bred using chimney pots on the south side of the village. In North Dean large numbers of Jackdaws and other Corvids have been seen lining the overhead cables (almost reminiscent of a Hitchcock thriller).

In our own garden a pair of Mallard became regulars, reserving the tiny island on our pond for their sole use. Two further pairs visited regularly trying to dislodge the resident pair. The female was incubating 12 eggs by the end of February. Eventually 11 tiny ducklings hatched on the 5 April. By this time two failed breeders had also taken up residence meaning that we had 15 Mallard resident in the garden. One of the ducklings was taken by a Kite, I suspect, and later three were taken in night time attacks by a fox but seven offspring eventually left the garden in mid Iune.

Whilst this was regarded as a big success the young ducks wiped out many of the newts, tadpoles and other pond life. A grass snake was seen in early May and again in June and July but clearly some of the pond life will need time to recover. A bold juvenile Grey Heron has become a regular visitor to our garden and others in the village and he is also taking a toll on the pond life (and people's goldfish in a couple of instances).

Other interesting birds have included a Cuckoo in College Plantation on 4 May and in Abbotswood on 26 May. Other summer visitors have included regular House Martins in Woodview Drive where I believe seven nests are in use. In the Spring Coppice Lane area two young Moorhens survived apparently and a Grey Wagtail was recorded at the end of June which might be one of the birds which bred successfully in Hughenden Park. The local Great Spotted Woodpeckers have raised several young and have been visiting fat blocks on bird tables in all parts of the village. At least two pairs of Red Kites have nested in the village and at least one pair in North Dean but I am uncertain as to how many young have been

raised. Down in Flowers Bottom young Tawny Owls were heard calling for food in early July.

The three Roe Deer who were regularly seen, which comprised a female with two youngsters born last year, have suffered at least one road casualty. I believe that the female fawn was killed in a road accident. The male fawn may simply have moved away or could possibly be the animal injured on the far side of Great Hampden that was then taken to Tiggywinkles. This year there is at least one new fawn with its two parents somewhere in North Dean.

One interesting mammal record was a hedgehog seen by Jeremy Symondson in Great Hampden. Hedgehogs are vulnerable to badgers and are therefore uncommon on the top of the Chilterns where badgers are widespread. Finally fox cubs were also reported earlier in the year on the northern side of Speen.

Speen School & PTA

Another school year has passed and we've welcomed our new nursery and reception children but also said goodbye to our Year 2 pupils. We enjoyed a year of very happy moments and would like to share some with you.

Back in March, the eagerly awaited classroom extension was officially opened by a very exciting visit from Sir Stuart Hampson, The High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire – known to most of the children as the person who stands in for The Queen. Rev James Tomkins performed the opening blessing. Lesley Nickol from the Oxford Diocese who managed the project financing also joined us, as did many parents, governors and members of the village who took part in a service led by Year 2 who wrote the prayers and read from the Holy Bible. Many thanks also to the parents who supported Jeni and for all the plant donations.

The Speen Safari Supper roared back into the village in March and as always was greatly supported by parents, past and present. Many thanks go to Helen Davies and team for bringing it all together.

Another village highlight was this year's Stargazers Ball – a jointly organised School and Pre-School event and it was judged one of our best ever. The cosmic theming, fantastic food, great music and a brilliant range of auction and raffle prizes – all generously bid for – gave us another fundraising success. Once again, thanks to Helen Davies and the event team of Clare Morris, Jo Podmore, Alex Allan and Antonia Winson for all their hard work. A galactic thanks to our main sponsors Jeremy Swan, Ten Mile Menu and GlobalizeMe and to everyone who joined us on the night.

The ever-popular SpeenSchoolFest was also a great success, taking space as the theme and bringing together 300 local school children with Mad Science sessions and art, poetry and music workshops – all masterminded by the musical genius of Kate Laughton and a brilliant team of helpers.

Not only were the PTA hard at work fundraising this year but we were also keen to spend in ways that made an immediate difference to the children and all agreed we wanted to support Mrs Hayman in helping to restock the school library. The older books have been recycled, shiny new stock is on order as is furniture. Year 2 leavers are also donating their favourite book to the school as a leaving gift.

Our heartfelt thanks to everyone in the village and local area who continue to support the school in so many ways. We greatly appreciate the care and hard work of the Board of Governors safeguarding and directing the school's future, many of whom are local residents, including Jackie Edwards. Jackie has been a member of the team for an incredible 21 years and recently retired from the role. We wish her all the very best in her retirement and continued equestrian pursuits. We also want to thank our fantastic reading ladies who regularly come into school

and who have helped us to achieve an above national average in literacy. Karen Woodward does a fantastic job as Caretaker, setting high standards and to whom the staff and governors are enormously grateful.

We thought we would also pose the question - What else do you know about your Village School?

The School has a long tradition with the first pupils registered on the 15th October 1862. Mrs Lidington, who has worked as a teacher at the school for the past six years reminisces, "When the school celebrated its 150th anniversary, I had the opportunity to go through the old school log books. It was a fascinating insight into the life of the people in the village. One of the things that really struck me is that one of the children, who featured by name for some misdemeanours, was one of those who later died for his country in the First World War. It helps to make someone real for those who never knew him. We had a great celebration day, with the children dressed up and reading extracts."

Happy recollections from former pupil Charlotte Hull who attended Speen School in the early 80s and whose children now attend include "the smell of the not very appetising school dinners that we were forced to eat; a very strict headmistress, Mrs Sergeant, who certainly lived up to her name. I remember her Dalmatian dog, Fritz, who we were sent to talk to in her office if we misbehaved. The school roof catching on fire has to be a highlight. I remember rolling down the banks at the back of the school; walking to the farm in North Dean to watch the cows being milked; delivering the produce to the older residents around the village for Harvest; and country-dancing, wearing the same costumes that the children wear today. Finally of course making long lasting friendships".

More recent memories come from Year 2 pupils who are about to move on to 'big' school:

My Amazing Monday at School

First I arrive at school and change my books. Next I write in a book called a journal. Then we play a fun game on the white board called 'Whack a Mole'; in Whack a Mole moles with numbers on pop out of holes and you have to whack the mole with the right number on. Then we do our normal maths. I do harder work even though I'm only in year two. After playtime we do our topic for the rest of the school day. Our topic for this term is about trains. My Monday at school is very fun.

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A HISTORY OF SPEEN



The "Leaves of Time" was first published in 2000 as part of Speen's Millennium Celebrations and is a history of the village and its inhabitants since records began. It records the building of Speen Chapel as well as the birth of our school, the origins of the 'bodger' and Speen's brush with the Second World War! It is a fascinating account of the self-reliance of the inhabitants of this remote hilltop village.

Updated in 2007, the current edition records more recent events in the village such as the school's 40th birthday, the opening of the children's bike park, the numerous Speen Group's fundraising events and of course the biennial SPEEN FESTIVAL with its art and photographic exhibitions, plays and musicals. All proceeds of the sale of the books go toward Speen Festival.

his reputation is clouded for ordering Arctic Convoy PQ17 to disperse. Within hours, Pound was shown proof that the German battle fleet was still in harbour, but he refused to revoke his order. Lacking their protective screen of warships, 24 of the 35 merchant ships were sunk, by aircraft and submarines. Months later, the brain tumour killed him.

Leading Seaman Harry Dean had easily the "cushiest number". He served in HMS Cormorant, a Receiving Ship permanently stationed off Gibraltar. This was a large ship that was sea-worthy but no longer fit for battle; it provided food and accommodation for naval crews - and sometimes troops - in transit to and from the Mediterranean. It was, in effect, a floating hotel. Interestingly, we found that HMS

Ambrose was also stationed off Gibraltar towards the end of WWI. The log of the British submarine E35 shows that it was transferred to the Mediterranean theatre in the autumn of 1917. On arrival at Gibraltar on 12th November, the crew rested aboard HMS Cormorant. On 31st December E35 was transferred to the Depot ship HMS Ambrose to take on stores before going on patrol. On 11th May 1918, acting on secret intelligence, E35 intercepted and sank the German

submarine U-154 off Madeira. That was a major coup; in less than two months, the huge U-154, on its maiden voyage, had sunk five merchant ships and badly damaged another four. On 20th December 1918, the weary crew of E35 – gratefully – boarded HMS Cormorant to celebrate Christmas . . . and the end of WWI. Did those two Speen men, Harold Stanley Austin in Ambrose and Harry Dean in Cormorant, ever meet and enjoy a Gibraltar run ashore?

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Nordic Walking

Nordic Walking is more than a walk with poles!

Nordic walking is a specific walking technique that is suitable for all ages and fitness levels. Although it initially started in Finland as a summer training exercise for cross-country skiers, Nordic walking has become recognised as a way to help recovery from sports injury, improve fitness, and manage long term illnesses such as Parkinson's Disease, heart disease, diabetes and osteoporosis. It uses 90% of the skeletal muscles and burns up to 46% more calories than ordinary walking but with reduced pressure on knees and joints.

Nordic Walkers use specially designed walking poles, so the upper body propels them forward as they walk. Apart from the poles and a good pair of walking shoes, no other specialist equipment needed. The majority of walkers exercise as part

of a group where instructors ensure that the correct walking technique is being used.

The Nordic walking groups provide a great opportunity to explore the Chiltern countryside and meet new people, while working on your individual fitness goals. Speen resident Donna Stephens has been attending a weekly Nordic Walking group for the last five months to help her prepare for the 'Walk the Walk' 13.6 miles charity walk in London. Donna said "The instruction and classes have really helped me improve my fitness and manage my asthma whilst preparing for the charity walk, and I am now looking for my next walking challenge".

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
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District Council News – July 2014



Much progress has been made with the major developments at Handy Cross, as anyone who has visited or passed through the area may know. Contractors are on schedule with the construction of the new Sports and Leisure Centre and a webcam has been installed so residents can see the progress for themselves – this can be viewed at https://timelapse.regenology.co.uk/api/embedde d/4ej/

Groundworks are being prepared for the Waitrose store being built adjacent to the new Centre, and opposite the Cinema, work has started on a NEXT home store, initially with the relocation of the Park and Ride facility. These developments will bring employment and excellent retail facilities to the area – with other exciting office, hotel and further retail opportunities being pursued for deployment from 2016 onwards.

The new synthetic turf pitch providing football and hockey facilities has been relocated to John Hampden Grammar School, and the new athletics facility with an eight lane track is close to completion in Little Marlow.

Closer to home, many people have expressed concern over the laying of tracks and the sale of woodland near Speen. I have been asking WDC officers to closely monitor the situation and take whatever action is possible if there is any breach of regulations. Unfortunately, woodland is covered by specific planning rules with a wide range of permitted development rights and so far, no inappropriate actions have taken place on site. If anything does occur, I will be pressing WDC to act immediately to address the situation.

If you have not already discovered the new car parking arrangements within the District, keep your eyes peeled, as following a successful trial in Easton Street and Railway Place, Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology is being rolled out across WDC's off street car parks, replacing the majority of the current pay and display machines. ANPR brings many benefits: for residents, there is no need to rush back if your ticket is expiring, there is reduced risk of getting a parking penalty fine, and there are more payment options available. For taxpayers, ANPR provides a more cost-effective and efficient way for the Council to manage its car parks.

The roll-out of ANPR should be completed by mid-August and will apply to all WDC car parks except the Wycombe Sports Centre, Dean Street and Riley Road in Marlow. Please note that the Eden Centre car park is not managed by WDC. Full details of all of the Handy Cross developments and ANPR can be found on the Wycombe District Council website, www.wycombe.gov.uk

Down on the Farm

Everyone thinks that farmers are paranoid about the weather! In truth it is the most important factor in our business. Soft fruit farmers are now growing their crops in polytunnels, with raised beds for easy picking and soilless compost with nutrients (tailored to the exact requirements of each crop) added in the water supply. The weather doesn't matter! We rely on rain to make the crops grow and sun to dry the hay and cereals.

Readers who are keen gardeners will probably have had mixed results in their vegetable patches this spring. Slugs and difficult germination conditions have necessitated resowing several crops. Fortunately for farmers, this year's cereal and top fruit crops promise bumper yields; good grass crops have already been ensiled or made into hay and the maize crop has had a frost free start. It is already head height instead of knee height, as it is normally at this time in the summer. We are now praying for rain as the grass will not regrow until some arrives!

Hughenden parish is having a campaign to highlight the problems which can occur on public footpaths and agricultural land when dog owners do not clean up after their dogs. Most people are unaware of the diseases which dogs can carry and which affect humans and grazing animals. Neosporosis and Sarcocystosis cause abortion in cattle and neurological disease in sheep; but for the general public Toxocara is most worrying, as it can cause blindness and children are most susceptible. The message is a) worm your dogs regularly and b) always clean up after them.

As many of you already know, 'contracts' with supermarkets are rarely watertight and growers often find that in times of plenty, supermarkets renege on their contracts. Christine Tacon (formerly head of CWS farming operations) has been appointed by the government to protect suppliers from the large retailers; she announced recently that Tesco and Aldi topped the lists for firm contracts with 43% coming into that category. Morrisons were bottom with only 33%. When they are let down at the last minute, producers rarely manage to find another market but they are wary of complaining to Mrs Tacon in case they lose the next order. Fortunately for us, the milk that isn't needed for ice cream goes to the Arla factory near Aylesbury, so we don't have arguments with supermarkets!


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
