We hope this year to replace the old pirate ship in the playground and expand the Little Apples Pre-school play area, so that will be our fundraising focus for this year.





## SPEENCHURCH

Our search for a new Pastor continues but in the meantime life at the Church continues to thrive and we have been blessed to receive a host of visiting ministers to explore the Bible and unpack its wonderful truths. We were fortunate to play a central role in



the Speen Festival, hosting three events and leading a closing service on the Playing Field to give thanks for the Festival. At the service we were joined by Jacquie Coles and some of the children from Speen School who taught us how to sing in tune and make the point that 'church' can happen anywhere – it is not the preserve of old buildings! We reflected on some of the key themes of the Festival, including caring for God's environment, looking after the marginalised in the local tradition explored by David and Ann Worlock at their fascinating talk, and the issues raised by the stars who answered 'Questions worth asking' in such an inspiring and often stoic way.

We work hard to bring meaning to our vision to make the church a place 'where community meets' and no one works harder than Kate Vale and her fabulous team of volunteers at Chapel Hill Kitchen which opens every Thursday. I am pleased to announce that the total amount of profits made from the café since it opened are fast approaching a staggering £20,000 and that is thanks to the loyal custom of so many villagers. The profits continue to be divided between four charities, namely Agape Alive in India *www.agapealiveinindia. org.uk*, Wycombe Homeless Connection *www.wyhoc.org.uk* One Can Trust *www.onecantrust.org.uk* and LIFT in Ethiopia *www.lifeinfulltrust.org*.

LIFT supports the efforts of Moira McLure, a North Dean alumnus and member of Speen Church who works to educate widows and orphans in a remote corner of Northern Ethiopia known as South Gondor. A big fundraising effort to buy a new 4x4 for Moira was a huge success and the new vehicle should be delivered by the time this goes to press. This will be of vital importance to Moira's plans to open a second school in a nearby village which can only be reached by unmetalled mountain roads. The proceeds from the Autumn market at Church on 17th October raised over £800 for LIFT. There were some wonderful handmade crafts and preserves on sale and the Church would like to thank the many villagers who took the time to make such individual gifts.

As mentioned, in a time of Interregnum

we can welcome people who give a fresh perspective and no one did this more powerfully than Rachel Dawson from the Christian charity 'Transforming Lives for Good' (TLG.) TLG works with children who have been excluded from school often against the backdrop of a broken home and financial hardship. TLG also provides hot lunches to children during the school holidays, ensuring that the vital benefit of free

school meals can continue uninterrupted. The deeply moving case studies presented by Rachel did indeed show how the lives of young people can be transformed irrevocably for the better. You can find out more by visiting *www.tlg.org.uk*.

Villagers and friends met at the Church in October to discuss and sample the merits of beer and sausages thanks to the good offices of The Chiltern Brewery. The Brewery is about to enter its 40th year of brewing great beer and throughout that time the business has been guided by a deeply Christian mission of 'Giving God the Glory.'

The Toddler group continues to grow and over 20 parents and children now meet every Tuesday morning at church. Links with Speen School and Preschool are strong, with the children visiting the church and exhibiting some of their wonderful work to illustrate their love for Jesus and God's Creation. If you visit the School, please have a look at the new banners which speak to the faith that underpins the awesome teaching that the children receive.

Looking forward, we have Remembrance Sunday on 10th November when we will gather at the Lych Gate to remember those who laid down their lives for us in military conflict. Before we know it we shall be looking forward to the biggest birthday in world history and I can promise you some wonderful goings-on at Speen church for the Christmas period. As we turn to Autumn we reflect on a very busy summer for both Speen Playing Fields and Ridgeley's Field, not just as spaces for children to play, cycle, run and 'hang out' but as venues for the Shindig, Fun Day, Fete and of course many of the fantastic Festival events. We would like to thank the Fete Committee in particular for their contribution which is being used to renovate the Pavilion toilets.

We are delighted with the enthusiasm in which S.E.A.G. have taken their idea of turning an area of Ridgeley's Field into a wildflower meadow and we look forward to this developing over time as not only an area for children to explore but also as a sanctuary for both wildlife and villagers.

Following a number of complaints, I would like to remind everyone that only Assistance Dogs are allowed on the main Playing Field and that dogs are not allowed off the lead in Ridgeley's Field. If your dog fouls please bag it up and take it home with you. Dog faeces and children do not mix and can cause serious illness. Unfortunately, we are having to put up further signs as reminders.

The recent Autumn work party undertook a large amount of work on a rare dry October afternoon. Despite a disappointing turn out we managed to cut hedges, strim banks, repair play equipment and give some Laurels a much-needed trim. Look out for the date for the Spring Work Party in March which will be followed by a BBQ. All villagers are encouraged to attend in order to help maintain your village fields.

The Playing Field Draw has begun for another year and we are very grateful to everyone who contributes. Routine Playing Field expenditure is just over £4,000 per year and covers grass cutting, insurance, utility bills and maintenance costs. We continue to 'just about manage' to balance the books with the support of the many fundraisers organised by the Playing Fields Committee.

Our main fundraiser is the annual bonfire and firework display taking place this year on the 2nd November. We are grateful for all the volunteers who make it happen and to all the spectators who come along, buy tickets and support us further through buying food and drink at the event.

The lighting of the Village Christmas Tree takes place on the evening of the 6th December. Join us for mince pies, mulled wine and carol singing. We have yet to confirm the charity we would like to support so if anyone has any suggestions please let us know.

The WI has been campaigning for many years on Environmental issues. It was as a result of a WI campaign during the 1950s that the Keep Britain Tidy Campaign was finally launched. Since then we have campaigned on the crisis for honey bees, how to reduce, re-use and re-cycle materials, what to do about food waste and in recent years plastic microfibers from washing our clothes. WI is also a founding member of the Climate Coalition. We were therefore very pleased to take part in the Environment event at Speen Festival organised by Jeni Fairey promoting these issues. By displaying and selling sustainable products which can replace plastic, we hope to have inspired people to try that little bit harder.

In September, our speaker Marcelle Siddall came to talk about an African Women's Project in rural South Africa. The conditions under which these women live and raise their families are extremely difficult and the charity aims to ease their lives by encouraging them to make goods which can be sold and the money used to improve their villages. Many members went home with beadwork and embroidery made by these women. Members have also decided that they will raise money to pay for a water tank to be installed in the village to provide a clean water supply and save the long daily trek.

We recently hosted a meeting for members from six different WIs in the area, when our speaker Ginny Davis



gave a wonderfully amusing account of her transition from Barrister to writer and performer of one woman shows. This also gave us an insight into the organisation that goes into appearing in your own show at the Edinburgh Fringe, which she took on as a challenge at the start of her new career.

In October, members are visiting the 'Hearing Dogs for the Deaf' base in Saunderton to learn about the training of these important helpers. November will be our Annual Meeting with a pot luck supper and the election of a new committee and President. June Pilkington has fulfilled this role for the past three years and is preparing to take a well earned rest while still being an active member.

In January 2020, Speen WI celebrates its sixtieth anniversary and we have many plans for the year. Already we have an exciting programme booked and as the year is also the Centenary of the Buckinghamshire Federation of WIs, there are many County Events in which to involve ourselves. We are already mapping out our routes to walk 100 miles for 100 years during the course of 2020 so we should all be superfit by the end of the year – or maybe we will simply have walked off all those cakes!

## KING WILLIAM IVUPDATE

Since the last update we have some good news in that we have secured grant funding from the Plunkett Foundation More Than A Pub programme *www.plunkett.co.uk/ more-than-a-pub*. Established in 1919, the Plunkett Foundation helps communities, predominantly in rural areas, to set up and run community businesses: enterprises



that are owned and run democratically by large numbers of people in their community. They help people to tackle a range of issues such as isolation, loneliness and poverty, and the businesses come in many forms including shops, cafés, pubs and other land-based initiatives. This grant allows recipients to spend up to £2,500 on costs related to initiating a community business project.

In the last update we spoke about obtaining a valuation for the KW4 from Christie & Co. We expect this to be completed early November and we will be able to use the Plunkett grant to pay for this advice. As we talked about in our last update, once we have this valuation, we will be in a good position to make an offer that reflects the current condition and local market for licenced properties, supported by our fundraising.

We have also engaged directly with Wycombe District Council and have had a very positive response. The Council have stated their intention

to use all the powers they have to support community groups to takeover community assets, such as closed pubs and get them open and trading again. We will continue to work with the Council to see how they can help us make progress.

Despite all this activity, it is disappointing to report that we don't anticipate achieving the goal of getting the KW4 open again very soon, but we do remain optimistic that this will be achieved at some point, we just need to be patient.

That's all for this update and again a big thanks to everyone for their continued support.

### **RIDGLEY'S FIELD MEADOW** SEAG Restore & Protect Project Jo Podmore and Jeni Fairey, SEAG

Insects, including valuable pollinators, are in decline due to four main factors: habitat loss; pollution; pathogens and nonnative species and climate change. One way we as individuals can help protect insects and plants is the restoration of habitat. This is not easy as our population increases and human demand on our planet becomes ever greater. The UK has lost 97% of its meadow habitat since 1940.

Speen Playing Fields Committee have very kindly allowed S.E.A.G to develop a wildflower meadow at Ridgley's Field which, as some of you will know, was left by the late Dan Ridgley to be used in perpetuity as a children's play area. Jo Podmore's design for the pathways and mown areas will eventually provide a wonderful opportunity for all to walk amongst the grasses and flowers and get right up-close to nature.

By increasing plant species we hope to gradually see an increase in insect population measurable by 'citizen science'-type projects. We are also planning seasonal educational and fun activities for children.

Work was completed on October 13th on ground preparation. We are being supported by the Charity 'Plantlife' in the form of expertise and seed donation. Our initial phase involves reducing the dominant grass on 200m square crescent shaped sections and sowing Yellow Rattle. This plant is parasitic on coarse grasses and creates space for a variety of wildflowers which will be introduced next year.

This is an ongoing project and one of many planned to develop any available space in the village as meadow habitat such as verges on

roadsides and outside our houses.

### **CLIMATE EMERGENCY** VILLAGE CARBON FOOTPRINT SURVEY


Climate change is happening fast. There is a climate emergency. There is too much carbon dioxide in the atmosphere and it is increasing relentlessly. Where is it coming from? Are we all part of the problem? What can we do to understand the problem before we identify how to respond as individuals and what we might do together as a community?

The newly formed Speen Environmental Action Group is following the lead of other community environmental groups in trying to find out the answers.

As a first step towards understanding how we impact on the environment, members of the group have estimated their own carbon footprints using an online carbon footprint calculator (called 'REAP Petite'). Like others, this tool estimates your carbon footprint (per person or per household) based on answers to questions about lifestyle and consumption including home energy use, transportation, travel and food. Your carbon footprint is expressed in tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent (CO2e) (which, for a given mixture and amount of greenhouse gas, is the quantity of CO2 that would have the same 'global warming potential' when measured over a specified timescale, usually 100 years).

Across the eleven participating households, carbon footprint values ranged from 11.11 to 21.26 tonnes CO2e per person (an almost twofold difference between the highest and lowest values). The average carbon footprint was 16.06 tonnes CO2e per person, which is similar to the UK average of 16.24 tonnes CO2e per person (using the same carbon footprint calculator). The carbon footprint per household ranged from 17.49 tonnes CO2e (for a household with one occupant) to 64.75 tonnes CO2e (for a house with four occupants). Even for those of us with a committed interest in this subject, the results were eye-opening.

Difficult to visualise? The following images show the volume of 1 tonne (equivalent to 1000 kilograms) of CO2 at the same density as the air we breathe.



Readers will no doubt be aware that the UK has committed to achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2050. The targets have been set but, as yet, there is no end-to-end plan to achieve this. Climate change protestors have been challenging these target dates and making a case that the Government must act now to halt biodiversity loss and reduce greenhouse gas emissions much earlier than this: net zero by 2025. Others have argued for dates between 2025 and 2050. Many are calling for a much stronger government lead - on all fronts.

Achieving carbon reductions from say 16 tonnes per person to net zero, or more desirably zero given that creating CO2e is an intrinsic 'by-product' to every aspect of our modern existence, is a daunting prospect. There is clearly a long way to go to reach net zero whatever the timescale.

Where do we go from here? We are all on a learning curve. Would you like to assess your carbon footprint so you can join us in thinking about what we might do as individuals and as a community to reduce our carbon footprint?

Which carbon footprint calculator should you use? There are many to choose from. Their results vary depending on their purposes, design and inherent arithmetic. All have their pros and cons.

We have been reviewing different calculators and will shortly be suggesting one for you to use. If you are interested in assessing your carbon footprint or having help in doing so, please contact us for more information.

## WILDLIFEWATCH

### Autumn 2019



My previous report mentioned the Moorhens that had reared five young in our back garden and that the parents appeared to be preparing for a second brood. They constructed a new nest for this further brood and this was remarkable in itself. The small island in our pond has an obvious depression at its centre that is used every year by the Mallard to nest in. I have protected this site with a large hoop of heavy duty wire mesh in order to discourage crows from pecking the eggs when the female is away from the nest. The second Moorhen nest was built on top of the mesh hoop whilst the female Mallard was incubating her own second brood of eggs in the tunnel below. We therefore ended up with a double decker nest with the Moorhen incubating her eggs directly above the Mallard. The second brood of four more Moorhens were all successfully reared and have now left the garden.

I believe that the Beeks also had 2 or 3 young Moorhens in their garden in North Dean so they have done well locally. Elsewhere in the village numerous Pied Wagtails and Swallows were noted at the Horses Home in July whilst Simon Jennings reported Tawny Owls calling down Coleheath Bottom in September. Alastair Blundell reports regular sightings of the Ravens over Ridgleys Field whilst Tony Bobroff photographed a Sparrowhawk at close quarters on a pigeon next to his car in Studridge Lane and then later also found an Elephant Hawk Moth caterpillar in his back garden.

Rarer birds in the area included a Wryneck in Naphill in August but one of the fairly local highlights was a Great White Egret that stayed on 'The Wides' on the Wendover Canal for 10 days in late July attracting birdwatchers from all over the county.

There have been a good number of pure black rabbits around the village for some years. Les Brown reports that the majority of the rabbit population in the Spring Coppice Lane area this year is pure black. A less common sighting was a weasel photographed by Mandy Gowling in her back garden in North Dean in August. Kerri Syner reported a further potential "big cat" sighting near the hairpin bend in Speen. Without photographs or evidence of paw prints it is difficult to know what this animal might have been.

## BEECHDEANDOWN ON THE FARM

In the last edition of Speen and North Dean News I wrote about the necessity of having grazing animals (cattle and sheep) to maintain the landscape of the Chilterns. Maintaining



the balance of the wild animal population is however equally important and much of the task of doing this falls on the farming community.

Pigeons attack growing crops, often to the point where they have to be re-sown. Crows attack new-born lambs, hence the outcry last spring when Natural England revoked gun licences right in the middle of the lambing season. Fortunately, this was put right very quickly. Even the Kites, of which Chiltern dwellers are very proud, have multiplied so quickly that, sooner or later some control will be necessary, if only to protect nestlings of songbirds. (Kites are thought to feed solely on carrion, but in our experience, they also take nestlings).

Forgetting about TB, badgers cause several problems for farmers. Their favourite sett building spot is where woodland joins a grass field. In building the sett, the badgers invariably break the fence. Less frequently they decide to make a sett in the middle of a field of cereals which



can result in damage to machinery and even turning tractors over. The increase in badger numbers has resulted in hedgehogs almost disappearing in our landscape; the badger

turns the hedgehog onto its back and scoops out its gut. It also destroys bumble nests in its efforts to obtain the larvae and food stores.

Of the four species of deer resident in the UK, only the roe deer and the red deer are indigenous. The fallow deer are grazers and large herds will devour grass crops grown for domestic animals. The muntjac are browsers and together with grey squirrels are rapidly killing all the young beech saplings. Local foresters anticipate that there will be no good beech woods in 100 years' time.

Excesses of animal species only occur where their natural predators are absent. Most farmers are knowledgeable wildlife enthusiasts, but when excesses do occur, farmers and foresters must be allowed to control their numbers, The number of badger setts in the upper Hughenden Valley have increased from two in the 1960s to at least ten today.

### The Lych Gate at Speen Chapel

In 1919, John Thomas Simmonds, the newly-appointed pastor of the Speen Chapel, proposed that the village should put up a Lych Gate as a memorial to the ten young men of Speen who had given their lives for their Country. Amongst them was his only son, Norman Cyril Simmonds.

We think Mr Simmonds had officiated at Loosley Row during the War (one source says Lacey Green) but he had created strong connections with Speen. His first wife had died and in 1903 he married Alice Wood, who lived in Woodbine Cottage. In May of that year, Norman Cyril, who had

just turned 11, started at our village school. He was a 25 year old Lance Corporal when he was killed in 1917. At his memorial service, held in the Speen Chapel, Mr A W Pay, the then pastor, paid tribute to Norman's leadership of many youth activities in the village, especially the Sunday School.

Using a spreadsheet, the Heritage Group has analysed the Speen War Memorial Balance Sheet that Mr Simmonds, as Treasurer, drew up in 1920. This was his clean copy; we found two previous attempts, in his distinctive handwriting, that show that he sometimes got into a muddle – donations that he attributed to the memorial fund were found to be intended for something else. Nonetheless, a story emerges of a remarkable fund-raising achievement by the tiny population of Speen, barely

by four individual donors, were entered in the cash book on 13th September. The fund was off to a flying start. Seven days later, nine personal donations were received totalling £82.11s. In two weeks, the Lych Gate appeal had raised £159.9.6d. That included one donation of £75: one of three guineas; one of £2; two of £1 and, tellingly, single gifts of 2 shillings, 2/6d and 3/6d. We can imagine that those three donations were real sacrifices.Between 22nd September and 19th November seven more people gave a total of £17.18.6d. That included 1 precious shilling.

1919 ended with £167.8s in the fund. The Speen firm of Ward and Turner produced a design for a fine lych gate with a memorial plaque that listed, in alphabetical order, the names and regiments of our 10 casualties. (The Leaves of Time says they constituted 20%-30% of

the young men of our village.) In November 1920 – possibly around Armistice Day, the date is illegible – they were paid £122.16.6d for the Lych Gate. One guinea was also paid for 12 Yew trees (15/= for the trees; 6/= for planting them) most probably to Mr Rixon of Fir Tree Cottage, who grew them. At the same time, £100 was donated to the High Wycombe War Memorial Hospital Fund. That memorial still stands at the hospital entrance.

Unfortunately, those payments totalled £223.17.6d, which was £46.9.6d more than the appeal had

nine months after the end of The Great War.

The memorial fund was opened in August 1919. Previously, the village had raised money for "Peace Celebrations" and two guineas (£2 and 2 shillings) remained. That was put into the fund. In a matter of weeks, William Rixon, the elder brother of Corporal John Rixon, who had been killed in Italy in the last weeks of the war, aided by his friend R Wood, raised an astonishing £51.18.6d. from the villagers. That, and £22.18s, provided raised. Fortunately, a donation of £20 was received in April 1920 and in October the Girl Guides produced £4.4.6d. On the same day 'A Friend' put in £7.18s. Was that all Mr Simmonds had available, or had he got his sums wrong, again? (£14.7s was still needed). Nothing happened for two years, then 6 people donated a total of exactly £14.7s. Two ladies gave £1 each; three people each gave a guinea and one generous donor provided the final £9.4s. On 27th November 1922 Mr Simmonds' Balance Sheet balanced.


