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
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## SPEENHELPING HOSPICES

or two of bubbly and each others' company. The records of the inaugural and first meeting were read out and caused much laughter as did other snippets from old records. In 1960 there were no first names recorded. Everything was so formal then and we are all really pleased that life is so much more relaxing these days and that the WI is an outward looking, inclusive organisation open to all women anywhere in England and Wales.

The following week the first meeting of the new WI was held and a committee of 10 was elected with Mrs Greenmon as President. It was agreed that there would be speakers 'of an educational nature' each month and tea and biscuits would be served. A short time later the minutes show that 'ladies were requested not to knit or smoke until after the speaker had finished'. One can only imagine the clatter of needles and the atmosphere in the hall during the latter part of the meeting.

As usual we have an exciting programme arranged for the year. At our February meeting there was discussion about visits and events to be held throughout the year which will be put in place to add extra interest. Members were then invited to 'Show their Love for the Environment' around Speen by creating Green Hearts with messages about what they love and what they try to do. Clearing litter, reducing plastic use, washing clothes less often to reduce the microfibers as well as reducing water consumption and not leaving appliances on stand-by were just a few of the actions being taken. These were placed on a board on the Village Hall noticeboard for all to see - but unfortunately someone decided to remove them within a couple of days. If anyone knows where they went to we would really like to know as we intend to use them as a basis for our actions on climate change.

Looking through the records it is apparent that WI members took an active part in village life, helping at the fete - as we still do - delivering meals on wheels, having a rota for cleaning the village hall and keeping the bus shelters clean and tidy. It was the WI nationally that brought about the Keep Britain Tidy campaign. The Annual Spring Clean in Speen was started by WI member, Gloria Holmes, and we shall be supporting this effort again this year on April 5th.

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## WILDLIFEWATCH

#### Winter 2019/20

Following a mild but very wet winter period we seem to be seeing signs of Spring with local frogs having completed their spawning. The mild winter produced few interesting records. Many species we would normally expect to see in our gardens have not really been about. Siskins and Redpolls have not been apparent on our feeders. Redwings and Fieldfares did visit the garden but in mid- March we still have quite a few berries left on our trees.

In previous winters we have had invasions of Hawfinches from Europe. This year the most recorded locally was eleven in late November at Great Hampden. I have had sightings of up to 6 Jays together and this is likely to have included migrant birds from Scandinavia. Other birds which tend to be predominantly migrant visitors include Woodcock and I recorded two locally in January. As usual this sighting was of the flushed birds disappearing into the distance. Their amazing camouflage makes them well-nigh invisible on the woodland floor.

Slightly further afield there were news reports that a White tailed Sea Eagle from a release programme on the Isle of Wight had appeared in Oxfordshire on a large private estate where it had been mixing with the resident Red Kites for several months. The precise location was not revealed but I suspect it was quite close to the M40. A bit closer to home

between Saunderton and Lacey Green the small vulnerable population of Corn Buntings have been getting help over the winter with extra grain supplied by the Chilterns Conservation Board which is trying to support our less common farmland birds. Yellowhammers will also be benefitting from this support. Another bird that gets support in the area is the Barn Owl with various nest boxes being provided for them in suitable territories by the Bucks Owl and Raptor Group. Interestingly a Barn Owl was noted on the outskirts of Speen just a week ago.

A few Roe Deer are still about but I think a large number must have been culled because numbers seem well down on what I had been recording. Jeremy Symondson reported five together in Monkton Wood in February but other than that I have only seen ones and twos.

Now Spring is here at last birds are staking their claims to nesting territories. A male Moorhen has returned to our pond where two broods were successfully raised last year. At night he has been calling to attract a mate and today one has arrived and nest sites are being investigated. Meanwhile two pairs of Mallard are laying eggs in nests around our ponds.

## **PONDLIFE**

I'm sure in this current situation, everyone with a garden is grateful for their own isolated patch of outdoors to enjoy the new spring warmth; the flower beds showing some colour; birdsong becoming more apparent and glimpses of the first butterflies.

For those who take delight in such things, nothing could be a greater addition to the garden than a pond. The benefits of having even the smallest of ponds with a couple of aquatic plants will reward you with not just an interesting feature but a noticeable rise and focus for all the wildlife activity in your garden: birds appear to drink and bath; dragonflies will patrol around it like miniature jet fighters and you can have your own patch of waterlilies to gaze out upon. The benefits for wildlife are even greater if there are multiple ponds in a neighbourhood. Species of all kinds will have more places to drink, feed, reproduce and thrive. So if you're looking for a project to start while isolated and can get your hands on some pond lining online, now is the perfect time to start before the ground hardens and plants will have a good chance to establish.

## BEECHDEANDOWN ON THE FARM

Last year farmers had to contend with a spring drought, and a very wet autumn which prevented arable farmers sowing autumn crops; if that wasn't enough we then were confronted with the rise of veganism. This year we were looking forward to a 'normal' year! Our hopes have been dashed already by floods and the Coronovirus.

For once Chiltern farmers are fortunate; our thin chalky soils allow the continuous rainfall to run through into the aquifer and we should be able to sow our crops and graze the grass when it eventually stops raining.

Of course Brexit has not gone away. Welsh sheep farmers are very worried because for years much of their sheep meat has been ex-ported to France. The rest of us are expecting less government support.

Unfortunately the areas which produce much of the grain and vegetables we enjoy are grown in the flat fertile soils which have featured heavily in the recent flooding. The soil structure will take weeks to recover and bring back to a fertile condition. Should the Coronovirus become pandemic then the population will certainly want to know

the provenance of their food but it looks unlikely that the yields from British farms will be up to normal.

The attack on the beef trade, led mainly by the vegans, meant a collapse in the market for store cattle. As a result we were unable to find a market for our beef young stock last autumn and, as we didn't have enough barn space, the animals have had to be 'out-wintered' which is not ideal when it is wet. Cattle and sheep grow thick winter coats which keep them warm even at low temperatures but are not waterproof. When it rains they feel cold.

A good summer (and by that I mean plenty of sun but enough rain to make the crops grow) would benefit the whole country. This is essential for many small farmers to survive. The recent Budget has done almost nothing to support the industry, with only £3 million being allocated for environmental schemes. We must however remember that the present restrictions due to Covid-19 are putting an enormous strain on all small businesses, so let us hope that a good summer will both benefit farmers and help to kill the virus.

SEAG held its first public meeting at the beginning of February in the Village Hall. Despite the Rugby being on, there was a good turnout of nearly 40 people. This signalled to us that there is significant support for local group action to tackle the Climate Crisis.

After a brief introduction about SEAG, the Climate Crisis and biodiversity loss there was a quick overview of the WWF footprint calculator and how it has helped us shape our actions at home.

Then everyone divided into discussion groups covering the four main topics: Food; Protect and Restore; Travel and Home and Stuff (energy use and other things we buy/ use at home). From the ideas generated by the discussion groups, everyone then had the opportunity to vote for the actions they would most like to see taken forward by SEAG in the near future.



Project themes with strong support included:

- Information sharing/advice on all subjects.
- Growing more food locally via 'Grow Your Own' and/or a community allotment
- Promoting biodiversity in our gardens, ponds and communal spaces
- Improving access to more sustainable forms of travel
- Activities to re-purpose/re-use'stuff'

On the basis of these results, we have decided to run a series of themed information events - the first will be a Renewable Home Energy Event. This will be a free public meeting - location, time and date tbc (postponed due to current events). There will be speakers on converting both domestic and public buildings to more energy efficient and lower carbon options including air source heat pumps and sourcing the best eco-electricity supplier.

We would like to engage everyone in Speen in ways to reduce our carbon emissions and improve our local biodiversity - do please keep an eye on our social media for current and future SEAG events and activities.

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
## SPEENGARDEN GROUP






Homelands in Ellesborough

#### Chair's Annual Report 2020

2019 was yet another busy year for both Speen Playing Fields and Ridgley's Field, not just as spaces for children to play, cycle and 'hang out' but as venues for many events. The fields provide continuity, a place for the community to come together in our evolving village.

Raising funds, inspecting and maintaining equipment and the pavilion, updating paperwork and processes, and emptying bins are amongst the many essential tasks that the trustees do. Managing these fields is time-consuming and as the financial report highlights, balancing costs and income is precarious, allowing little scope for future investment or upgrades in our facilities.

There is a seasonal pattern to what we do and 2019 was no exception. Starting with the Spring work party which provides a good opportunity to get everyone together early in the year.

Fun Day followed in June led by Matt and his team of captains, inventors and referees. Congratulations to the winning White team. Although primarily a village icebreaker, funds were raised through donations, bar, and BBQ. Thanks once again to all involved.

The joint fund-raiser with the school had limited success, raising only £432 in total. I'm very pleased that for 2020 the Community Ball is returning to the Playing Fields with both the school and SPF committee jointly pulling off what I'm sure will be a fantastic event and fundraiser.

The Pirate-themed Fete took centre stage in July. We were chosen as the main charity, receiving £1,260 for the upgrade of the pavilion loos. An excellent start has been made, with the final plumbing and flooring to be completed before this summer.

In September the very successful Festival made good use of both fields and the sunshine. The Autumn work party followed with blustery weather and very enthusiastic Laurel cutting.

Environmental concerns continued to dominate headlines throughout the year. SEAG volunteers, with the support of the charity 'Plantlife', planted an area of Ridgley's field with the parasitic yellow rattle plant. It is a long-term project with the end goal to have a maze of wildflowers and pathways to be explored and enjoyed by wildlife and villagers. Going forward, environmental issues will become a greater part of the Playing Fields considerations, be it looking at how we can best manage the fields to increase biodiversity, whilst still maintaining the charities core purpose or through ensuring we have policies in place minimising our environmental impact.

Moving on to Bonfire night. As usual it was a challenge. It wasn't the paperwork this year, but a deluge of rain which resulted in a very sensible decision being taken to postpone the event to the Sunday evening. We managed to maintain a team of volunteers and fortunately covered costs, making a small profit. It highlighted the vulnerability of our key fundraiser to the weather. Space exploration is obviously not for Speen with the Speenex Rocket and launch pad being engulfed in flames before take-off. Thanks to Peter Symonds for the work involved in designing yet another unique bonfire, to the builders, to Keith Jones for the firework display, to safety marshalls, to Andrew Price for organising the bar and all the other volunteers who manned the gates and BBQ.

The closing event of the calendar year was the lighting of the Christmas tree. Although it began at the Christmas tree, a noisy procession then made its way down to the Chapel Hall where mince pies and mulled wine were served. Carols were led by the Laughton's and around £60 was raised for Wycombe Homeless Connection.

In January SPF coordinated the Christmas Tree Recycling service raising over £400.

Cristina Delgado and her team continue to smoothly manage the very important Playing Field Draw. Ticket sales remain steady and as always, we are grateful to Cristina, Jim Barton and all the individual collectors for their roles.

So, moving on to 2020 and goals for SPF year ahead:

- 1. Maintain a positive bank balance
- 2. Complete the toilet upgrade
- 3. Continue to maintain existing play equipment to ensure both that safety standards are met but also longevity
- 4. Continue to play a key role across village organisations
- 5. Continue to upgrade processes and paperwork providing a safe legal framework for what we do
- 6. Ensure we are aware of the environmental impact of the work we do and look at ways to improve
- 7. Encourage new people to join the committee (ideally with communication/publicity/technology skills) and look for a new Chair for 2021 onwards.

I would like to thank all the trustees for the generosity of time and skills that they donate to support the Playing Fields. Thanks also for everyone in the community who supports the Playing Fields through attending Charity Events, joining Work Parties or through taking part in the Playing Field Draw.















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## **OBITUARY**

#### John Edwin Rogers

John was born in Havendale, North Dean on 29th October 1931. He was the son of Charles and Gladys, and the younger brother of sister Joyce. Charles, who subsequently lived in The Turnery for many years, gave long service to the village as a stalwart of the North Dean Village Hall Committee, and his commitment to community service had a profound influence on John for the rest of his life.

John attended Speen primary school, and later attended Wycombe Technical High School (now known as John Hampden Grammar School) where he flourished both in the classroom and the sporting realm, as a very effective cross country runner and table tennis player.

Post school, his technical abilities secured him work as a Telephone Engineer at the GPO (laterly BT), where he spent the whole of his long career. Alongside his busy working life was an equally important personal life. John and Pat's paths crossed after Pat's family moved south to North Dean from County Durham in 1947. Pat served the family of Sir Samuel Turner in their home, North Dean House. Through local chapel and village hall events John and Pat met and romance blossomed, and they married on 25th October 1954. They had obtained permission to build a new home in North Dean, Beau Vista, where they spent the rest of their married life together, and to their delight their son Stephen was born on 21st June 1959.

John became a staunch and vigorous member of North Dean Village Hall Committee and indeed chaired it for many years. He was also a Trustee of the Village Hall for many years. He played cricket for the village for decades, and he, Pat, and Stephen were always critically involved organising the fete, social events and games nights, amongst other things. His service to the community further developed when John was coopted onto Hughenden Parish Council in 1979 and was re-elected continually until 2011, a total of 32 years. In 1979 Hazelmere was still a ward of Hughenden Parish and at that time around 20 Councillors met monthly at Hughenden Village, John representing North Dean Village as part of Hughenden Valley Ward.

He was Hughenden Parish Council Vice Chairman between 1994-98, Chairman 1998-2002 and again in 2007-2009. During that period the Council Offices progressed from the Clerk using his own house as an office to the use of a portacabin in the car park on the Common in Gt. Kingshill to the opening of the present office and meeting room on that site in 1998.



John also chaired the finance committee and served on a variety of sub committees. Service to others was a part of John's nature and he was an inspiration to many. He was renowned for his willingness to take on extra duties, and gave freely of his time. He had a great knowledge of the Parish, which enabled him to deal with issues objectively and contribute constructively. He was a good listener, and always found the time to talk to residents.

John worked co-operatively at all levels, and as a result the Council achieved much

during his time with them, such as the continuation of a tree planting programme, the construction of a new play area on land donated by the Council in Templewood, Walters Ash, and obtaining a site for the new Doctors Surgery in Hughenden Valley.

John retired from BT in 1991 and this enabled him to pursue not only his community work but also his love of gardening, holidays with Pat, and golf. John and Pat celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary in 2014, complete with telegram from the Queen. Both John and Pat were presented with a beautiful stained glass roundel at the 2005 fete, which had been specially commissioned in recognition of their outstanding service to North Dean when they retired from the committee. He later retired from the Trustees on 27th January 2007.

John's life changed in 2014 when he suffered a major stroke, and although he made a good recovery he never returned to his former health and mobility. Sadly he had another, more profound, stroke in 2019, and was readmitted to the stroke unit. His initial small steps of recovery could not be sustained though and he passed away on 19th August 2019.

Everyone who knew John will remember him and revere him for his genuine humanity, for his modesty and for his lifelong interest in every facet of life in his beloved North Dean. He had a quiet sense of humour and his integrity was respected throughout the local communities. North Dean residents in particular will be eternally grateful to him for the many years of service he bestowed on the village. He will be remembered with great fondness, and will be sorely missed.

John is survived by his wife of 64 years Pat, and his son Stephen.

His funeral took place on 30th August 2019.

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
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
