

THE LUWERO SAGA

New readers begin here ... Early in 2000 David Kemp flew out to Uganda with £4,500 raised by and from North Deaners and £2,000 loaned to build an AIDS Ward as part of North Dean's Millennium efforts. He returned leaving the building largely completed but all the money spent. During the summer several hundred pounds were raised by a runner in the Wycombe marathon from an article in the 'Guardian' and various donations . . .

On September 30th a 'Grand Supper Dance' was held at Pigotts – fine music from Phil Singleton's "POJO" (Pigotts Ocean Jazz Orchestra) and a great meal cooked by Sue McClaughey and friends. 132 sat down to supper in the Main Barn, the other bar was active, profitable (and legal!) and the whole costs of the evening were met from the profit of the raffle! North Deaners and their friends – and several tables of Speenites – ate, drank, danced and frolicked well into the night. A warm message from Sister Ernestine in Luwero was read out – not every dance has a blessing from another continent!

Our thanks to the many people who made it happen and gave their help – musicians, cooks, servers, the clean up team etc. When the bar profits, the ticket money (at £20.00 per head)

and the thousand pounds + of generous cheques from those who could not come were totalled, the evening made a profit of £4,500! We could use this to pay off the £2.000 loan and David, who went out to Luwero again the following week, took £3,500 to complete the "North Dean Ward" (see front cover!) and to give Sister Ernestine something towards equipping it. It has 22 beds, office and treatment rooms and was formally opened in January by the papal nuncio.

We have now to consider whether we continue and develop this link or accept that our initial Millennium objective is attained. People have been extremely generous throughout—the £10,000 raised works out at an average of more than £100 for each household in North Dean. Thank you

SPEEN MILLENNIUM CELEBRATIONS

After nearly 2 years of often pretty frantic activity, the Speen Millennium Celebrations project will soon be wound up, save to make its final donations to the village (see <u>The end</u>, below). I think it is fair to say that it has made a vigorous contribution to village life over that period, and it is now perhaps appropriate to reflect on what was achieved.

The beginning

The Millennium project was started in January 1998 when Marjorie and I held a public meeting in the Village Hall to gauge interest in the idea of producing a history book and a pageant about Speen. The objectives were both to commemorate the forthcoming Millennium and to help to develop community spirit in the village. About a dozen people turned up which, we were told as newcomers, was "good" for Speen, but it did at least provide the basis for a working group.

By June, a formal Speen Millennium Celebrations Committee had been established including representatives from most village organisations; a "Memories of old Speen" day had been held and Bob Johnston had organised and begun his highly successful Village Walks. (They ultimately ran throughout the summer months for three years!) A Millennium stall at the 1998 Fête help put us in contact with a few more interested people.

Finance was a concern. Although the Parish Council had already kindly pledged support, we did not know at that stage that we would obtain further generous assistance from Wycombe District and the Speen Shop Charities Fund. A rolling programme of activities was therefore generated both to raise funds for these major items and also, in keeping with the original objectives, as a means of involving the village in a wide range of communal activities.

The middle

- * Second year of Village Walks.

July 1999

* "The Leaves of Time", village pageant: involving about 135 people and watched by nearly 800.

November 1999

* "The A to H of composers". Speen Millennium Choir and other local musicians/singers.

February 2000

* Tree planted on Playing Field to commemorate the pageant.

March 2000

* "The I to Q of composers". Another concert from the Choir and others.

May 2000

- * Village Walks begin again for the third year.
- * Beating the Bounds of the Ward of Speen. June 2000

* Midsummer Day's Quiz

July 2000

- * The Village Fête, at which are launched:
- "The Leaves of Time," a History of Speen by Martin Stockley and Bob Johnston; Village Map, limited edition prints of Peter Symonds' water-colour; Calendar for 2001, local scenes sketched by Gillian Goodall; Millennium mugs available for every household in Speen, courtesy of the Parish Council; Postcards depicting old scenes of Speen.

Speen Millennium Celebrations—Final Distribution of funds

At the time of writing there is in fact still one unfinished project, which is the "Domesday Book" of Speen featuring, basic details of the present population of Speen, with accompanying photographs of many, to be made available in CD-Rom and book format. This is expected see the light of day in the early months of 2001.

The end

Speen has some tangible mementoes of the Millennium to pass on to future inhabitants - not least the Village Sign and the History of Speen. For the present generation, young and old alike, there are some wonderful memories of the pageant. A new choir has been formed and will continue into the new Millennium. From the whole project, acquaintances and friendships have been made throughout the village among folk who might otherwise scarcely have passed the time of day.

The Speen Millennium Celebrations project never set out with the objective of raising money except as a means of financing its own activities. However, it was a stated intention that, should there be a surplus at the termination of the project, it would be used for the benefit of the village. As it turned

out, the pageant and the history book were both highly successful and broke even financially, the former with the aid of the sponsorship mentioned above, the latter through sales alone. Furthermore, the other activities listed above not only played a big part in the village's Millennium Celebrations, but also generated surplus funds which are now available for disposal.

The Committee is therefore inviting suggestions from villagers for the use of these funds. We have no preconceived ideas, but would prefer proposals that:

- a) are likely to be long-lasting
- b) benefit a large number of people
- c) are not something for which other funds should be available
- d) will cost between £100 and £4000. Supporting quotes would be helpful.

Please send proposals to me, as Chairman of the Millennium Celebrations Committee, Driftway House, Coleheath Bottom. All suggestions received by April 30th will be considered by the Committee as soon as possible afterwards.



In contrast to his former life, Brian's conversion was startling good news, and his visits to prison are not now due to criminal activities, but to share his faith with prisoners and offer them the opportunity of a renewed life.

Alpha Course

Monday evenings have been very exciting this autumn as a group of up to 18 adults and teenagers have been exploring what Jesus is all about - some coming to an understanding for the first time of what it means to choose to become a Christian, some taking that decision to be followers of Jesus, and others deepening their existing faith.

Sharing supper together in a relaxed and friendly environment has helped many to voice their doubts and questions, and find some answers to them.

We hope to run the course again after the summer.



SPEEN PLAYING FIELD ASSOCIATION

Newcomers to Speen may not realise that the Playing Field, next to and behind "The King William IV", is not owned by the Council, but by the villagers themselves. Two acres of land were bought from Courage's Brewery in 1935 and a further quarter acre later with money from public subscriptions. The Field is registered as a charity and is managed by a Committee elected annually. The Committee's job is to manage the Field in the way in which the villagers wish.

The Playing Field Committee is responsible for providing and maintaining the Pavilion, children's play equipment, mowing equipment, the seats, litter bins etc. and ensuring that the Field and its surrounding areas are kept in good order.

To finance all this the Playing Field Committee need your help to raise funds. Part of the income is met by villagers contributing to a fortnightly draw. Residents are encouraged to buy at least one ticket each at a price of 5p per week Approximately half the money raised from the Draw provides income, and the other half provides prizes, 1 of £10, 1 of £5, and 2 of £3. A list of winners is displayed on the Playing Field notice board and the Parish Council notice board at the end of Water Lane. A number of collectors are responsible for different areas of the village, and they call annually to collect contributions, which are £2.60 per ticket.

The Draw is registered under the Lotteries Act 1976 with Wycombe District Council. We therefore invite any residents who are not already members to join our Fortnightly Draw - or as an alternative we are happy to receive donations from anyone who is opposed to the idea of raffles.


Additional fundraising events are organised by the Playing Field Committee from time to time but the draw is the most regular source of income. Expenses are kept to a minimum by Committee members providing most of the labour involved in maintaining the Field and its surrounds, with help from residents when big tasks are involved.

It is in the interest of all in the village that the Playing Field is kept as an attractive open space available to everyone and particularly providing a safe place for children to play. Adults who are not involved with activities on the Field would surely like to see that our 'village green' is maintained in good order.

ay I firstly belatedly wish you all a happy New Year. This year will see a major change in the way the Council is run. Gone will be the old committees and in their place will be a new cabinet structure. All of this results from the Government's reform of the public sector requiring all councils to make changes in the way they work and what they do.

Wycombe District Council will change to the new decision-making structure from May this year and run it as an experiment until November. It is designed to make for faster and more accountable decisions. In addition, the Council is also reviewing all its services to see how they can be improved.

New powers and duties have also been given to the Council to promote the economic, social and environmental well being of the area. The Council is working closely with the Town and Parish Councils to identify the key issues facing their area over the next five years. This will help the Councils to identify the actions that need to be taken.

One result of the change will be the introduction of public speaking at full Council meetings from May 2001 allowing you to have your say on things that matter to you!

The formal hearings to determine the Local Plan are continuing with the inspectors taking evidence. This stage will probably conclude by the end of June 2001 after which it will be for the inspectors to prepare their findings which are anticipated to be issued early next year.

On the local front, meetings have continued to take place at Lacey Green in an effort to find ways to improve the parking/traffic problems experienced at school set down and pick up times. It is still very much early days in the discussions but some progress has been made with all interested parties taking an active part.







He could tell them that some of those attending had not had an outing for years and it required a great deal of persuasion for some to leave the surroundings of home.

The pledge was drunk with musical honours, the company singing "For he's a jolly good fellow" Mr. Baker (Lacey Green) gave a pleasing rendering of the ditty "In the shade of the old apple tree." Mr. Walker receiving officer) in response wished it to be known that the expenses did not come out of the rates, the funds were raised by kind friends.

Mr Rupert Stevens (tailor of Speen) proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the workers and subscribers.

reparations were then made for a series of athletic sports on Naphill Common and thither the Monks Risborough Star Brass Band led the way. On the common tobacco was liberally supplied to the men and sweets to the women and children.

There was a touch of pathos as the old folk chatted about "good old times". One old infirm recipient told how he once had to pay 12 1/4d (twelve pence and a farthing) for a loaf of bread and 11 d per pound for bacon.

Another told of years threshing corn at one shilling and six pence per day. Chimed in a third "I don't want to go back to them days". Amongst the races was the Old Men's Slow race (the last home being the prize taker)





SPEEN VILLAGE SIGN UNVEILED

Don White said he had specially selected the weather, and who's to say he hadn't? It was, , a fine December morning when about 80 vil-

lagers congregated at the junction of Hampden Road and Chapel Hill to witness the unveiling of the new Village Sign. The sign was the idea of Peter Symonds. It was one of the Speen Millennium Celebrations projects and also had gained the support of the Parish Council. However, Peter is not only an ideas man, he has many practical talents too, and he set to work on the immensely time-consuming task of designing and artworking the sign himself. After the design was completed, further lo-

cal input was provided in the final construction. First, Gomme's Forge cast the metal sign at Loosley Row, after which Peter came back into the picture to hand paint the finished article. Peter Tomlin then fashioned the massive oak pillar on which the sign is mounted, and finally Mark Wengler installed it on its stone base.

Several aspects of Speen are reflected in the sign. The lacemaker and the bodger are

strongly associated with the village and represent two of the crafts upon which it grew from a small farming hamlet in the late 18th

Century to the much larger and socially active community of the 20th Century. The Chapel is also depicted, as it has played a major role in Speen village life for nearly 200 years - and continues to do so. When you next pass the sign, stop to look closely at the marvellously detailed representation of the Chapel's flint Last, but by no means least, the plinth at the foot of the sign has been built with Denner Hill stone - specially selected for the job because of its history as a building material in the village

and, in its extraction and cutting, as a onetime source of employment for Speen's inhabitants.

A time capsule is buried under the monument, containing a copy of the electoral roll and other mementoes of contemporary Speen, but it is to be hoped that our new sign will stand guard over the site for many years. Maybe even to the next Millennium?

Bangers, Bonfire...and all that Jazz!

ith November 5th falling on a Sunday this year, Speen's annual tradition of celebrating Guy Fawkes Day landed on the 4th, being the closest Saturday to the anniversary. The four hundred plus years of celebration for this event around the country presented itself with a bonus cocktail of entertainment in Speen this year.

Once the noise of the bangers, rockets and starburst had faded and the bonfire reduced to a small pile of burning embers, those lucky enough to have tickets retreated from the noise of the Playing Field to the Village Hall, a venue fast becoming a regular celebration of Jazz music.

With Martin Hart, leading his quartet in his now familiar style, the audience were transported through what is probably undisputedly the best period of jazz of the last century

Moving relentlessly from one composer or lyricist to another with hardly a pause for breath, the audience were treated to an extravaganza of both popular and also lesser-known music from the 20's, 30's and 40's, passing swiftly yet orderly through the three decades of music.

With good tradition, the evening started with the time honoured "I Got Rhythm" played with no apologies, to get the audience toe tapping and in the mood from the start. The casual narrative style of Martin Hart followed the first tune, sort of, filling in the holes of history as to how the music or lyrics came into being. I say "sort of" because many stories from the showbiz world often derive from a combination of hard - or not so hard fact, popular assumption and often well-planned publicity. Never the less, they are always fun to hear related time and again for the sake of us lesser educated mortals on the fringes of jazz appreciation. Martin has developed his own style of presentation, which is easy to follow and informative. His use of brief notes, rather than formal script adds to the informality of the evening and in the best tradition of the improvised music - as jazz has always been described - fitting perfectly with the concert's title of the evening, "The Poets of Tin Pan Alley."

The evening saw the welcome return of Mike Wills after just over a year's absence and this time armed not only with his Clarinet but also a trio of Tenor, Soprano and Alto Saxophones. Mike has now made several appearances at the Village hall and brought his range of Saxophones by popular request.

Also returning from last year's Dave Brubeck's concert was Roger Munns, playing the keyboard. Roger's talent combined with a highly versatile instrument provided a wide variety of sound and a true touch of authenticity through the developing and changing trends of Jazz of these three decades. We also had the opportunity to welcome, for the first time to the Village Hall, John Monney. John plays what we would expect to call the Double Bass, except his instrument was also electronic, in the form of a Bass Guitar, once again lending itself to wide ranging sounds to "blend with the trend" - so to speak!

Lastly, the Martin Hart Quartet was joined by, a fifth musician. Elizabeth May provided vocal support, showing not only a great talent for jazz music but also a wide and varied range to suit the large number of songs performed throughout the evening. Dressed in an alluring "black number" she added a welcome touch of glamour to the proceedings and I suspect helped keep the tempo up to pace for the rest of the "mature" Quartet!

Jerome Kern and Dorothy Field featured during Elizabeth May's introductory song of the evening "I Won't Dance" quickly followed by "Lady Be Good," sung at a different than usual, but equally catching tempo.

Many of the classic songs and tunes were also on display and played in their familiar clothes. Anything Goes, I Wish I Were In Love Again, Swonderful, Isn't It a Pity, Change Partners, Everything Happens To Me, Cheek To Cheek, Witchcraft, all were on parade to keep the toes tapping and the hands clapping throughout the evening

The finale was provided by the Duke Ellington tune, "Take The A Train" but once again the audience was side-tracked by the quartet, having being joined by Elizabeth, adding a little known vocal version of the well-known tune. Although generally attributed to Ellington, it is said that "A Train" was, in fact, written by a life long colleague Billy Strayhorn. Lyrics were added at a later time, specifically, for one particular concert, and rarely heard since. It provided a very nice and unusual curtain drop to a very popular and enjoyable evening, obviously appreciated from the sounds of boisterous applause following a number of encores and the eventual close.

One of the ways we had looked at, was to set up meetings with residents at either Village Hall or Residents Association Monthly Meetings. This we hope to start in the next few months. I would like to hear from anyone interested in attending such a meeting. The format would take the form of a talk by the clerk, and the Chairman, outlining a brief history of the Council, then a more in depth presentation of the Councils responsibilities, and how Hughenden Parish Council is applying them. A discussion period would follow when you could raise any issues that you feel relevant.

Another area of interest, which many of you may he unaware of is the work within the Parish carried out by the Parish Warden. He has many and varied duties, but because North Dean is a small part of the Parish you may not have seen him very often in our Village. One duty he does carry out on a regular basis in North Dean is to inspect our play equipment for safety. This is a legal requirement incumbent on the owners, in this case North Dean Village Hall, but is a free service by the Parish Council. He is an expert in the dying art of hedge laying, if you are driving along Naphill's main road slow down at the junction to Chapel lane, where there is an example of his work on the hedge surrounding the gas chamber in the verge of the


