

Speen Festival 7th to 15th September 2001

Speen held its first ever Festival in September - and that was a week, that was! The venues were the Speen marquee and the Village Hall, the dates September 7th to 15th, and if there were ever any doubts as to whether Speen could put on its very own Festival, they were dispelled by the attendances and the active support from the community.

Over 700 tickets were sold for the various events (mostly within the village) and when the numbers attending the non-ticketed events were taken into account, there were reckoned to be over 1200 "visits" to the Festival in total.

Equally gratifying was the fact that such a large cross-section of the community took part or lent a hand in some way or other. At least 130 people actively contributed to the Festival's success, whether by performing, organising, putting up and taking down the marquee, publicity, box office, finance, designing and printing, making props, catering, stewarding, car-parking, flower arranging,

fetching and carrying, making costumes, auctioning antiques, exhibiting their art or photography, or otherwise helping with the myriad of tasks that such an enterprise requires. The overall logistical task was organised and managed by John Holmes. To all of these people I should like, on behalf of the Committee, to say a sincere "thank you."

"Alice" - director Marjorie Stockley

The Festival opened with a dramatised adaptation of Alice in Wonderland, written and scored especially for the occasion. This was very much a team event in which the children of the village played a big part. Laura Page was a delightful Alice, and the costumes, make up and inventive props helped to create a genuine Wonderland for the entertainment of all. Every ticket was sold and over 400 people watched the show, including an invited special needs audience on the final dress rehearsal. A signer for the deaf helped to increase the enjoyment of a group with

hearing difficulties on the Saturday matinée. The enthusiasm for "Alice" tremendous, building on the foundations laid by "The Leaves of Time" pageant two years ago, drawing in welcome newcomers to both performance and staging. Such was the euphoria that one member of the cast has already started writing a script (and it's not me this time) for the next Festival!

Art and Photography Exhibition - organised by Glenn Hart

This was a showcase for the many talented folk in Speen whose skills with the brush, the camera or in crafts are too rarely displayed to the public. A wide variety of styles and subject matter from nearly 20 exhibitors was to be enjoyed and admired in the Village Hall, and over the 2 days of the exhibition it received an estimated 250 visits.

Open Gardens

Catherine and George Butler, and Charlie and Sheila Pearson kindly opened their gardens on the first Sunday of the Festival so that visitors could pass from the Art Exhibition to the Roadshow, and then on to admire a village garden.

<u>Speen Antiques Roadshow</u> - organisers David and Pauline Flynn

A fascinating all-day event in the marquee, with antiques and other articles for sale, and demonstrations of relevant skills such as furniture restoration. In addition, members of the public brought along about 200 items for valuation by experts in their field, and an auction in the afternoon, conducted with professionalism and great humour by Dave Evans, disposed of some 50 lots. "The George Gershwin Story" - organised and presented by Martin Hart

Another event that could probably have sold itself twice over, and the lucky 130 ticket holders had a real treat in store. Martin brought together a talented jazz quintet (with himself on drums) that really brought the marquee alive, and provided added enjoyment between numbers with his knowledgeable commentary on the composer's life and works. Many of Gershwin's melodies remain familiar standards today, and a glance round the marquee at the beaming faces and tapping toes was all that was needed to confirm everyone was having a great time.

<u>The Natural History of Speen</u> - presented by Peter Symonds

The Village Hall was packed with people eager to watch and listen to this slide presentation on the wildlife of our village. They weren't disappointed, and I for one would be more than happy to sit through it all over again! We in the audience could only wonder at Peter's skill, patience and knowledge as he took us through 12 months of Speen's flora and fauna as captured by the lens of his camera. We came away with a renewed appreciation of what a beautiful place we live in.

NORTH DEAN FETE

the day that the rains came down

North Dean Saturday 4th August

The sky grew darker and darker and then the rain came......the band grabbed their music and instruments and fled; umbrella carriers gained new friends and hurried to the marquee; those sedately enjoying tea and cake (£1) in the hall were joined by a noisy dripping crowd; boys darting about just getting soaked; the books and clothes and all on the jumble stall grew forlornly wetter and wetter—and so North Dean Fete 2001 was ended by almost an inch of rain.

A lot goes into a good fete--- "the committee" meets each month with an ever longer agenda item. In North Dean we make good use of tradition: "He's been our judge for years"---- "they always run that stall"----- "You did so well last year"---- "I think I can get my cousins to come again"---- "That won't work, we tried it years ago"---- "I don't mind doing it again"-- "The Chairman always---- ". But for us this year our tradition has ended.- John Rogers retired from the committee chairmanship, a matter considered in verse on the programme (and reprinted on page 25).

Then the collection of bric-a-brac and tombola, reminders through the front doors, recruiting "volunteers" and preparing the field and the hedges, and borrowing tables and chairs and equipment, printing enough programmes and checking on gear loaned out (who has got our hoopla rings?), finding the banner and the bunting. In the evening before, loyal workers laying out the field, pricing the bric-a-brac, ("Whoever produced that?" "What can that be for?), folding tombola and raffle tickets, preparing a few new attractions etc, etc.

The morning dawns clear enough, but the forecast is uncertain. From early, up to a score of helpers at work in all parts of the field; straw bales, coconuts and the bar arrive; side-show are laid out and carloads of jumble. The Beechdean 'Bus' and it's mini satellites take their place. The fine Speen marquee is (partially) filled by show entries – well over two hundred this year, carefully recorded, numbered and displayed. Then the judges get to work: in a few classes the lone

"First" has no second or third – in others a first, second, third and a clutch of "Highly Commended" certificates give something for later visitors to disagree with. In our show no entry fees are paid, nor prizes given (except for the junior classes) but there is a range of ageing silver trophies (most presented by long departed residents) for polishing and cherishing.

At 2 pm the opening ceremony. Many who arrive on time are there for the bric-a-brac (not open yet) and cluster there vulture-like, letting the opening speeches go. Slowly the clouds and the crowds grow—the sun shines, the band plays and the company wanders to and fro, talking with friends and making new ones with a beer or ice and parting with 50p-or more for a go here or there. Some lads work out winning ways on the tombola, a cricket 'blue' tests the back netting in the coconut shy and the band plays on despite younger and younger volunteer conductors. After two hours prices of the bric-a-brac are falling as we get down to the draw of the big raffle. But-----the sky grew darker and darker and then the rain came-----

We drew the raffle later (helicopter lesson for one pensioner----large soft toy with Dalmatian spots for another), later still had a village party in the marquee and on Monday evening the committee met to review the day, celebrate a satisfactory profit, and a lot of work and fun (and we drank a glass or two). Thank you if you came, thank you again if you helped—and if you missed it, come in 2002! (3rd August?!!).

News from Speen Baptist Church

Andy writes:

September was to be a whirlwind month of activities in our communities but the devastating events in America on 11th September brought us up short. As our hearts go out to the victims and the families of those involved we are faced, not only with our own mortality and frailty, but also with a very real sense of 'there, but for the grace of God, go I'.

Yet, as we reflect on some of the stories and funerals, we occasionally see a light of grace shining through in the midst of such brutally shattered lives; even in the horror of it all some people have found the strength of God's grace.

Your community church was open for prayer and reflection on the Thursday and Friday, and a special service was held incorporating the European three minutes silence on Friday morning. With Strike Command so near, we continue to be mindful of those whose service enables us to live in prosperity and peace.

Friday 14th Sept Dr Caroline Berry 'The Human Genome Project and our future'

We were very fortunate to have the opportunity to hear Dr Berry, who, until her recent retirement, headed a team of Clinical Geneticists at Guys Hospital. She kept the audience engrossed for the whole talk, starting with a very understandable explanation of our genetic makeup. (Though I may have got it a bit wrong when I said we share 50% of the genetic make up of a banana!). From her wide experience she was able to show the many benefits that genetic research has already brought - and which we often take for granted. Yet behind the scenes of patient care, the increased options already available can thrust patients and their families into very real and painful dilemmas.

Looking at the future fruits of the Human Genome Project, Dr Berry explained how the application of detailed genetic knowledge of individuals and populations might be handled. Alongside great advantages we could see the potential for harm for both individuals and families: It was clear that the fruits of genetic research can be a mixed blessing. There will be another opportunity to hear Dr Berry speak at one of the Ladies' Breakfasts during the 2002-2003 season.

Saturday 15th Sept Men's 'Breakfast with Friends and ... Professor Sam Berry'

Whereas his wife is a human geneticist, Prof Berry is an ecological geneticist - which must make for fascinating breakfast table conversation. Until his recent retirement he was Professor of Genetics at University College London and in the audience was one of his past students. No names - but I will disclose Abbotswood as the habitat!

Prof Berry's fascinating talk was based on the view that God speaks to us, as it were, through two books - the book of his Works (ie the world around us), and the book of his Words (ie the Biblical record), and that study of both is necessary as they illuminate each other. Consequently he experienced his work informing his faith, and his faith informing his work. No problem for him seeing evolution as part of the picture - but a picture in which human beings are given a responsibility to care for creation rather than to destroy it.

Sunday 23rd Sept Senior Citizens' Top Ten Songs of Praise and Harvest Tea

Nearly 40 of our more experienced neighbours enjoyed a hearty tea after an hour of singing their favourite hymns. This year we had a three way tie for first place between O Lord my God when I in awesome wonder; Come ye thankful people come; and We plough the fields and scatter.

Many thanks to all who contributed to the Harvest 'Home and Away' gifts scheme. Away - we raised over £120 for the Toybox charity to help street children in Guatemala; Home * the harvest produce was received with open arms by Saunderton Hostel.

NORTH DEAN MAN'S BIKE RIDE HELPS RAISE £900

On Friday 5th October, three friends and I cycled 87 off-road miles from Bath to Henley, raising over £900 for The Anaphylaxis Campaign. We cycled the towpath of the Kennet and Avon canal until we reached Reading, where we picked up the river Thames to Henley. It took us 12 hours in total, including rest breaks and a very welcome lunch; the only thing on our plates we didn't eat was the cutlery and napkins. The trip computer on my bicycle registered that 8 hours of the total time was actually spent spinning the wheels, equating to an average travelling speed of around 10.5 miles an hour.

Luckily for us the weather was as good as it gets this time of year and the muddy patches of towpath weren't too churned up. The Kennet and Avon canal meanders through some beautiful countryside, particularly in Wiltshire, and the 29 lock climb up to Devizes is an impressive feat of premechanised engineering. Despite some inevitable aches and pains at the end of the journey we all felt a tremendous sense of achievement. It was a day none of us will ever forget.

We'd already decided to cycle this route when it occurred to me that I could use my endeavours to raise some money for charity. As my five-year old daughter Harriet has a severe nut allergy, the Anaphylaxis Campaign was an obvious choice. I was delighted when my friends took away sponsor forms to help me raise money for this cause, but I certainly didn't expect just four of us would raise as much money as we did.

Thousands of people in the UK have potentially fatal food allergies; this condition is known as anaphylaxis. The Anaphylaxis Campaign was set up to help them, advancing research into the cause and promoting awareness to the food industry of the condition.

Although there have been quite a few local and national news stories of fatalities through food allergies, eating out is a constant worry to a parent of a child with this condition. There are still a lot of people serving and selling food in this country who really aren't aware of this condition and it's potential dangers.



REDEDICATION OF SPEEN GRAVE

One of the many interesting features of Speen Baptist Chapel is the two Victorian "leaping boards" in the graveyard. In these memorials, a wooden board bearing the epitaph and details of the deceased is fixed between two short posts, rather resembling a low hurdle. They were presumably cheaper than the expense of engaging the services of a stonemason.

These memorials are to be found to the right just after entering through the lychgate. Unfortunately, wood is less durable than stone and one of the boards, a few feet from the path, has sadly now all but disappeared. However, the second board, which is situated under the trees a little further from the path, remains more complete.


In an attempt to ensure the survival of this remaining leaping board, Bob Johnson and Dennis Claydon have cleaned it up, restored part of the original inscription and applied a good coating of preservative. Take a look next time you visit the Chapel.

So whose is the grave over which the board was placed? Francis Free was a chair maker, wood turner and dealer who lived in the area in the mid-19th Century. Born in Hughenden in 1817, he married three times, living at Naphill and at Stony Green. He died at Prestwood in 1878. Although not a resident of Speen, Francis Free was clearly a worshipper at the Chapel here, where he was finally laid to rest.

Keen to see the restoration marked in a fitting manner, Bob established through his researches that some of Francis Free's descendants were still living in this area. So when Andy Gower agreed to conduct a rededication of the grave, this was able to take place in the presence of several family members. Among these was Paul Evans, who had considerable knowledge of the family history and was able to give a brief resumé of Francis Free's life.

SPEEN Gift of wireless

Owing to the generosity of Mrs Clifford Bax, Speen is now provided with a most efficient wireless receiving installation. A committee has been entrusted with the custody of the apparatus and the arranging of entertainments in the Village Hall and elsewhere. At the first concert, held on Saturday, the audience expressed great appreciation to Mrs Bax for her generosity, and to Messrs Simmonds and Ward for the services they had rendered in erecting the equipment. The Chairman, Major Caldwell, stated that it was proposed to form a Wireless Concert Club and also to loan the apparatus to residents who desired to listen-in at their own homes. During the evening the broadcasting concerts at London and Birmingham were greatly enjoyed.

At a public meeting held in the Village Hall on Saturday, the 27th ult., a deputation, consisting of Major Caldwell and the Rev. Chas. Carter, was appointed to meet the Parish Council with regard to the provision of a public telephone call office in Speen.

For those of you who have not had young children growing up in and around Speen, Speen Pre-School may not be a familiar part of village life, but those who have had a part in the Pre-School's development from its humble beginnings as the local playgroup to an established pre-school with an excellent reputation, will recognise that it is a local institution to be proud of. We are fortunate to have the support of the Speen Village Hall Committee, the Shop Committee and the Playing Fields Association. The latter has allowed us the use of part of the playing field so that the children can play outside in the summer.



Wycombe District Council News September 2001

This quarter the main news coming from the Council concerns the set backs to the Western Sector Project in High Wycombe. This has come as a major blow to the Council and its aspirations to provide a further quality shopping centre together with new bus and library facilities. It is my view that the Council faced an uphill battle from the outset when the decision to force Tesco from the site was taken back in 1998. This meant that inevitable delays would occur whilst compulsory purchase action was undertaken which in turn lead to the withdrawal of the funding partner Great Portland Estates. However all is not lost and the Council is taking urgent steps to ensure that the project revitalised. I hope that these will be brought about quickly enabling work to restart as soon as possible.

One area of policy I am keen to promote concerns the 'Vital Villages' initiative. This coupled with what is already in place to promote Village Design Statements means that the rural policy is much higher on the agenda than before. The Vital Villages initiative is aimed at helping local schools and businesses (shops, pubs etc) that provide services to village communities, with financial help. Funding for projects is made through Bucks Community Action acting on behalf of the Countryside Agency. WDC has taken action to provide assistance when making submissions so if you would like to know more then please contact Laura Olson at WDC (01494-421226).

On the local front I was pleased to persuade Mike Knight, who heads Bucks C.C. Area Office at Wycombe, to visit Speen and take action in clearing the drains and replacing the white lining on Chapel Hill and relining the Hampden Road. Action should also be in place to reset the signs vandalised on the night of the School Summer Ball. I was also pleased to be able to assist in keeping the bus service from Speen from being cut this summer and would like to thank Don White for bringing the matter to my attention in time to act.

You may recall that in the summer edition of the S&ND News I asked if monthly surgeries would be helpful. Those I have spoken with have suggested that personal contact that exists at present is sufficient to advise of concerns and so I

have not pursued the idea of surgeries any further. If you do have any concerns regarding local issues or have noticed areas where action is needed then please let me know

A Bridge Drive raised some very useful funds and planning is in hand for Flower Arranging classes in the Autumn and a Burns Night Supper with Scottish Dancing in January 2002.

Speakers have delighted us with demonstrations of Decoupage and also Glass Painting techniques, and in August we were taken through the West of America via San Francisco after the Earthquake had struck.

Speen WI put on a display of all that the WI does, and stands for, in the Craft Marquee at the Village Fete and this brought great interest from Village people and also from visitors. And funds came slow, though quickly spent.





THE BEES

After collecting my grandchildren from school I decide to take them and their dog for a walk. We go down a local footpath into a field. The feeling was great and as we turn for home I notice a strange sausage hanging from a tree, which is alive and moving in a spooky manner. The children are rather frightened, and I don't blame them. I realize that it must be a swarm of bees. We watch as an increasing number of bees join the mass.

After feeding the children and dog, I think I ought to contact someone! I get a local bee keeper who doesn't want them. Eventually I find the local contact, and a beekeeper phones from Bledlow. Yes, he wants the bees and he is coming to collect them as soon as possible. I explain he will need the farmer's permission (I am doubtful he will get it because of foot and mouth) to get onto the land to collect the swarm. Can I show him where the swarm was when he has already got permission from the farmer? He arrives at my house and I take him to the field, with the thought that the bees could have gone by now, and evening was coming on.

After some searching we find an even larger sausage hanging from a branch about 10 feet up. He needs a ladder and a full beekeeper outfit from his van. After collecting all he needs, and Martin and I getting our cameras, we return to the swarm, but stay well away from the swirling bees.

The plan, we are told is to gently bend the branch down over a piece of sacking and then put a basket over the swarm and bingo, one swarm finds a new home.

The beekeeper climbs up the ladder in full bee-keeping outfit and Martin and I start to take photos, from a safe distance!

Suddenly instead of the branch bending slowly, it breaks and crashes to the ground near the sacking. The bees fly furiously into the air, and some returned to the tree to a nearby branch.

He carefully collects as many bees as possible under his bee basket. This takes a lot of time and patience, as the remaining bees have to be encouraged to join the queen in the upturned basket rather than return to the few left on the tree.

We all wait for about an hour and a half as the basket slowly fills with bees. If you touch the outside of the basket it is really very warm. When it starts to get dark, we have to stop waiting for the rest of the bees and leave them to their fate.

As we walk back to the van I ask the beekeeper if it was worth his while to collect this relatively small swarm. Oh yes! Didn't I realize it was worth about £150?




