There are two superb fund-raising efforts to report this time. Reg Taylor, under the auspices of Princes Risborough Rotary Club, raised £15,500 for charity, of which £7,500 was paid to the National Children Homes, through his sponsored bungee jump off the Victoria Falls Bridge in Africa (page 22). Nick and Rachel Wheeler-Robinson organised a production of the musical "Cabaret" at Pigotts from which £9,900 was raised for Brompton Hospital, to provide facilities for youngsters with cystic fibrosis (page 26).

In addition, there are the usual round-ups from various village organisations as well as some interesting reports from individual contributors.

Speen and North Dean remain socially very active communities, as the events of the summer confirmed in spades. 

The Shield - won by North Dean for the first time by the narrowest of margins (1 point), having previously only managed to share it with a draw.


Bill and I would like to thank everyone who took part for coming along and making the day the success it was, and also to thank the staff at PR Golf Club for the excellent food and the use of their facilities

A Stitch in Time



When I opened a drawer this morning, looking for a muslin bag to hold lavender flowers which have reached perfection in the garden outside, I found some scraps of material which I had carefully hoarded for years. Poppy red, delphinium blue, swimming-pool turquoise, palest pink, soft grey, cream and white - they were reminders of years of sewing with my faithful Singer machine, which was a present on my twenty-first birthday and which I still prefer to those slick electronic models favoured today.

I rarely do much sewing nowadays but how much satisfaction it has given me over the years!

I was a full-time housewife and Mum - and loved that, for so many reasons - so I had time to make clothes for children as well as myself. I also made curtains and cushion covers and did some modest upholstery. And I was not alone in my enthusiasm. My mother-in-law kept a treasure trove of remnants, cotton reels and oddments of ribbon, lace and bias binding and she could often supply necessary items without making a special journey to the shops. She was a dab-hand at alterations and even "ran up" a whole series of little knickers out of my father-in-law's cast off vests when I was "training" my toddlers.

My grandmother was apprenticed to a dressmaker when women wore whalebone

stays under bodices which fastened closely and primly with a continuous row of tiny buttons and she considered that the short flapper styles of the twenties - as worn by my mother - were shapeless and quite shocking. What she would have made of some women's wear today can be imagined.

In my day we had sewing lessons in school. Not only did we do French seams and run-and-fell seams by hand, we learned about darning and patching and mending hedge tears. We also cut bias strips of flowered material and bound the edges of the domestic science overalls needed for cookery lessons.

Those sewing skills are outdated and many would say "Thank goodness!" but I do wonder sometimes if the lack of emphasis on developing manual dexterity in youngsters to-day, in favour of push button work and entertainment, will eventually lead to an increasing sense of frustration and a grave loss of the pleasure brought about by using their hands creatively.

District and County Council News October 2003

Green Waste Collection

At present there is a debate within Wycombe District Council on Green Waste Collection. Driven by Government directives to increase recycling targets for councils, a proposal to introduce Green Waste collections is being considered. The plan is provide separate bins for Green Waste (kitchen and garden waste) to be collected fortnightly and to be processed for Compost. The District Council's bid to fund collection failed to get Government support and therefore any collection will have to be paid for out of Council Tax (circa £350,000 per year). People I have asked so far have suggested support for the recycling of plastics and glass but not green waste, the preference here being for home composting. I would appreciate any views you may have so that your priorities on Council expenditure can be made known.

Parish Boundaries

The WDC Regulatory & Appeals Committee, at their meeting of 24th September 2003, considered the Parish proposals to create a new parish of Speen. It was their view that there was insufficient evidence before the Committee to reach a conclusion and that no further action was to be taken on this matter. They also resolved to advise the Parish Council of the procedures necessary should the Parish wish to conduct a parish poll in order to establish public opinion.

The Tranquil Project

This is proceeding approximately to programme and following the series of public exhibitions at various Village Halls, has now moved on to the second phase. I was pleased to see so much public support for the project and the positive suggestions that have come forward from the consultation process. All of the information that has been collected has been assessed and is being collated with a view to bringing forward an Opportunities and Proposals Report. Officers are due to meet in November to finalise the proposals. The final document should be available for consultation with stakeholders and residents early in the New Year.

The Speed Limit Review

This has progressed with the completion of the

collating of all existing data for our area by Babtie, the Council's Consultants. There appears to be some problems arising that could mean that our project area is put back. I have taken this up with Officers and suggested that any further delay is unacceptable. At present I am awaiting a firm response and have been assured that if action can be taken to avoid delay then this will be done.

A4010 Culverton Junction

The proposals were deferred from the County Council's Planning Committee September meeting and as yet no new date has been given to consider the application. I understand that this was done to give more time to address concerns over environmental and other issues.

Local Road Works

Coleheath Bottom / Hampden Road - An order for haunching and edge strengthening at this junction has been issued to the contractor to enable the work to be carried out within the next 3 months. Pink Road and Green Hailey to Hampden - It has been agreed that the white lining on these roads is to be redone.

Community Leaders Fund

As I mentioned in July the County Council has renewed the funding for Councillors to support Local Community Projects. My allocation was completely taken up last year and I have again been given the sum of £2,300 to support those community projects requiring 'top up' funding to reach their targets. So far this year I have been able to support the Lacey Green & Speen 81st Club with an outing, the Speen Village Hall with the cost of redecoration after the fire and Radnage with some play equipment. If you are aware of a project that is need of funding then please contact me.

If you do have any concerns regarding District or County Council issues or have noticed areas where action is needed then please let me know and I will do what I can to help.



Eveline Butcher (1916 - 2003) died earlier this year. The following biographical notes were read at her funeral in July

Throughout a long life her feet were firmly on the ground, calling a spade a spade. Working in her garden, she knew how to dig - and woe betide anyone that didn't!



Eveline was one from generations of farming folk then living in the Beaconsfield area. She was born at "Mumfords" and was taken, when old enough, across the fields to school at Gold Hill by her elder sisters, where she also attended regularly the well known Methodist church there. Her maternal grandfather farmed at 'Heath Row', familiar to all of us now as the busy London Airport, from where he supplied hay for the hundreds of horses working in the City of London.

Her family moved to Prestwood in the early 1930s as part of the staff of Wren Davis dairy farmers of Collings Hanger. She and her father, who was head cowman, delivered milk to their countless customers in all the surrounding villages, where she became a friend to all who knew her.

The Second World War saw her in the A.T.S. as a driver, where she was proud to say

that the Queen, then Princess Elizabeth, was one of her officers. The end of the war saw her back again, doing her milk round, meeting old friends and making new ones with her daily deliveries.

The affinity between Eveline and the Davis family has remained since she was first engaged as part of their staff by Wren Davis himself over seventy years ago.

Only last September she attended a happy gathering at Great Hampden church for Rex's thanksgiving service where she was acknowledged with respect and affection by the whole of the Davis family.



Earlier this year, Speen's Natalie Awdrey made a visit to Mexico with World Team Challenge.....

On a sunny morning in July, I set off on one of the most exciting and daunting experiences of my life. It took almost a day to finally arrive at my destination – Mexico City.

After the first few days of collecting supplies and traipsing around the most dangerous parts of the capital we set off for the mountains of Oaxaca. We stayed in Ixtal Juarez in some log cabins in a pine forest. During the time in the forest I travelled for the first time in a wide range of open top trucks – feeling more like cattle than people!


On only Day Seven of our month-long trip two girls were taken ill and rushed to hospital. Despite the commotion, the next day eight of us got up at 5am to trek 500m to the peak of the mountains at 3000m. It was an exhausting trek but definitely worth it. In all my life I have never seen a sight so magnificent; we all felt proud of ourselves and slowly made our way back down to the campsite.



Los Pozuelos mountain


After this sadly brief spell in the mountains we travelled in a minibus down to the city of Oaxaca where we were to stay at an orphanage. During our time there I felt we did some amazing work and made some amazing friends. Firstly we cleared the rubbish tip there in order to level the ground to concrete and gravel it to make a playground. After four days of exhausting work it was completed and the team took to painting various murals around the playground area and within the buildings. During this time we took it in turns to visit the magnificent city centre. The architecture astounded me and I bought some amazing handcrafted items to take home. Towards the end of the week the orphanage leader took us to a shop where the famous black

Oaxacan pottery is created; we met the potter and he told us the story of how the pottery was made, originating from a small mountain village called Coyotenec.

We also visited two Mexican ruin sites which was the highlight of the trip for me. Firstly we went to some Zapotec ruins at Mitla.

I was speechless; I couldn't believe I was there. However, I was in for a surprise because the next day we visited Monte Alban which hosts even more spectacular sites. It is a huge ruin site of almost a square mile; I spent hours walking around the steps looking at the beauty of the ruins set against the mountain scene behind it. Within the museum were some treasures which had been rescued from the buildings, including the full skeleton of a woman and the skulls of sacrificed children. It was extraordinary.

After staying in the orphanage we went back to Mexico City and visited the Pyramid of the Sun. There I saw the most intricately carved ruins I had seen; they were covered in serpents coming from the centres of flowers – a symbol of fertility. That afternoon while in the Museo Nacional de Antropología I saw Lucy. (For those of you not archaeologically minded Lucy is the oldest human skeleton ever found!) It was a miracle to me to see her standing there in front of my eyes; I had no idea that she was in Mexico and I was not, of course, expecting to see her. It was the most spectacular moment of my life.

For the remainder of the trip we stayed in the Northern part of the country moving from Mazatlan

to Los Mochis and ending in Chihuahua. To arrive there we travelled on the world-renowned Copper Canyon railroad. It was surrounded by breathtaking sights of beautiful mountains, rivers, canyons etc. During the train ride I met two Mexican men who taught me all about the Copper Canyon region and it gave me a great opportunity to test my Spanish!

In Chihuahua we had a guide called Alejandra who took us on several mountain treks and took us to the pottery village of Juan Quesada who now tours the world selling his pottery in exhibitions. One of the treks which some of us went on took us through our first bit of Mexican desert. We clambered to the top of a rocky hill and soon realised there was an extreme thunderstorm heading straight for us! We practically ran down and began sprinting across the desert, only to stop to eat prickly pear on the way! Unfortunately the snack stop put us in worst trouble as a sandstorm began brewing to our other side!

I returned to England exhausted and awestruck from all the incredible experiences and things I had seen. After a long flight back I was glad to curl up in my bed and rest for a long while, forever remembering everything that had happened to me.





News from Speen Baptist Church


Andy writes:

Speen Festival 2003 - a retrospective view

This year's Festival built upon the success of the inaugural 2001 event, assisted no doubt by a spell of pleasant late summer weather. The individual events have already been recorded in the special colour edition of this newsletter that came out a month or two ago. Suffice to say here that the Festival was well attended throughout, with audiences of about 1000 for the various ticketed events plus an estimated further 300-400 visits to the nonticketed events. Also important was the fact that so many people took an active part in one way or another - at a rough estimate over 120, spanning all ages from the under fives upwards - making it a genuine community event.

Financial support was gratefully received from Lacey Green Parish Council, Speen Shop Charities Committee and Wycombe District Council. In addition, there was sponsorship in money or materials from the JNP Partnership (James Jenkins), Philip Green & Partners, and Woodside Secretarial (Jude Awdry). Needless to say, all of the 120 or so people who helped to make the Festival happen gave their time - in some cases a great deal of it! - free.

However, Speen Festival was never conceived to be a profit making project and the costs of putting it on are not inconsiderable (total expenditure over £7,500). There is also a

risk element, since financial commitments have to be entered into with no guarantee of income. This year, through a combination of excellent ticket sales, good planning and the benefit of experience gained in 2001, the Festival made a modest surplus of around £800. It is proposed to hold this money on account to be carried over to 2005. In the course of staging this year's event, the Festival also purchased two gazebos which have been donated to the village for general use in community events.

It would be heartening to see Speen Festival continue into the future as a regular biennial event, as was originally envisaged, and to judge from reactions to the first two Festivals, there is a great deal of enthusiasm for it to continue in this way. For that to happen though, there will need to be a translation of enthusiasm into commitment and we shall have to see more people coming forward who are willing not just to lend a hand, very welcome though that is, but to take on organisational responsibilities for the logistical side of things and/or running events. So, if anyone out there is prepared to put down a marker to be more than casually involved in Speen Festival 2005 - I shall be delighted to hear from you!



By the time you read this at your table, the video taken at the jump venue will already have be shown at a number of meetings in Speen and the Princes Risbrough areas.



Reg and his wife Sue departed for Zambia on the 20th August, on an overnight flight which





Wildlife Watch by Peter Symonds

The summer months again produced some interesting wildlife records for our area.

Bottom produced two Coleheath interesting finds, both, unfortunately, of dead specimens. In early July the remains of a Slow Worm were found. Whilst Slow Worms have been recorded by others in North Dean in the past, I had never recorded one in Speen. In mid July I found a Purple Emperor butterfly dead on the track. This male had evidently been feeding on horse manure when it was killed by a vehicle. Regular readers will recall that I recorded two sightings of female specimens in 2002 of this nationally rare butterfly. Added to other reports of sightings from Spring Coppice Lane the evidence suggests that we may have a small population of this impressive butterfly in the village.

Numerous observers noted the presence of Hummingbirds Hawk Moths, a migratory species from the continent, feeding on Honeysuckle and Buddleias around the village for much of the summer. The hot conditions also saw a good number of Painted Lady butterflies mixed in with Marbled Whites, Skippers and Blues above Flowers Bottom. Other local butterfly sightings mentioned to me include a Dark Green Fritillary and a White Letter Hairstreak.

There have also been a number of interesting bird records for the area. I have had second-hand reports of a Rose-ringed Parakeet visiting gardens in Cherrytree Close, Speen in early September. These large green Parakeets are extremely noisy and raucous and are unlikely to be mistaken for other species. Significant numbers of these birds thrive in London parks like Kew and have more recently spread along the Thames and can regularly be seen in Marlow and Maidenhead. However this is the first

record that I am aware of for Speen.

Another interesting sighting first reported by Dick Seekins was a male Wheatear in the fields above North Dean in late September. This bird which was presumably migrating south remained present for several days.

During the summer a profusion of Orchids could be seen on the slopes above Flowers Bottom with Common Spotted, Pyramidal and Bee Orchids recorded. Another member of the Orchid family, White Helliborine was recorded by Jeremy Symondson elsewhere in the village.

Pied Wagtails nested in the village again preferring accommodation at the back of the King William this year. Two Spotted Flycatchers were reared in Water Lane. House Sparrows, which are in severe decline nationally, bred well apparently in Hampden Road close to the heart of the village, although they are not recorded at all from Abbotswood. Whilst numbers of House Martins and Swallows seemed down Francis Caldwell reported ten House Martin nests in use around The White House with some having double and even triple broods.

Sparrowhawks bred well to the North of Speen and Kestrels seemed to prefer Bryants Bottom Valley this year. Kites and Buzzards were present through out the year although I have no definite of breeding success. Three Buzzards were noted together high over Spring Coppice Lane in September.

Other records outside our area included a Black Kite (the continental version of our Red Kite) at Kings Hill, a Roe Deer in Lacey Green and unconfirmed sightings of a Polecat and Goshawk.

Please let me know of any interesting sightings.

VICTOR ELFORD



Victor Elford, a former resident of Speen and Hughenden and a popular artist and furniture designer, has died recently in Devon, aged 92. Following school at Priory Road and the Royal Grammar School, he attended High Wycombe Art College. He was employed by Waring & Gillow for a number of years, during

which time he worked on the interior of the Queen Mary, but fine art was his real love and he won a number of awards in this field. Two years ago one of his paintings fetched £30,000 at Sotheby's. During the Second World War, Mr Elford was an RAF airman, but happened to be on board a ship when it was torpedoed. Although rescued, he was then stranded for a while in West Africa, where he kept up his talent for drawing by the use of charred wood from the camp-fire. Victor Elford lived at Plovers Grove in Water Lane, Speen, from 1958 to 1966.

The sketch below, drawn from roughly where the children's play area is now, was of Speen Playing Field in the 1950s and appears in the book "The Leaves of Time - A History of Speen." We know that Mr Elford had acquired a copy of the book and spotted his sketch, because he rang me out of the blue to introduce himself as the artist. I thought at first he was going to harangue me about copyright, but in fact he was just delighted to have had his association with Speen recognised again. Thanks to Don White for sending me the obituary from the Bucks Free Press.


