

SPEEN FUN DAY 2004

THE CLASH OF THE TITANS – REVISITED

It is a truth universally acknowledged that the Speen Fun Day is the most competitive event in the English sporting calendar. This year's event proved no exception. Life is never the same after one of these events.

Long before June 2004, the committee was burning the midnight oil. The fact that all of the committee meetings took place in the King William should not be misconstrued. Omnipresent ThinkofEverythingSymondson and FixitWalsh might have been seen with glasses in their hands, but a casual observer may have missed the wedges of e-mails stuffed in back pockets. Some of Speen's finest brainpower was recruited to devise new tests for a new generation of Krypton competitors – to reach the outer limits of sporting endeavour. Some things never change! When the author arrived in Speen many moons ago, one of his first memories was DoctorWellyPeake's annual tour de force. This institution is now so inexorably linked to Fun Day, that separating DoctorWellyPeake from the tools of his trade would be impossible!

It had come to the committee's notice though that during previous years' events, a certain amount of – and one hates to say this in Speen – cheating had taken place. The committee therefore focused its attention on such anti-"c" measures as reinforced sacks for the sack race. The sack race - in which the cheating had been blatantly underfoot - deserved special scrutiny: this year no competitor would be able to run with legs coming out of the bottom of the sack. Finishing rules would also be tightened, so that members of the crowd would not be able to pretend to be race finishers, when their own team became confused and disorientated and did not finish an event. The movement of apples between buckets would be monitored. New measuring equipment would be commissioned to ensure that the measurement of water in ILikePLayingWithWa-

terBaines' now classic game would be to the nearest millilitre. Unfortunately, these objectives were only partially achieved. Read on.

In the Whistle Obstacle Race, all teams

completed the initial 180 degree turns surprisingly well – almost as well as colonies of ants could do if given the same test. However, on the home straight between the obstacles, the adjudicators noticed that communications between whistlers and whistled at included some surreptitious body checking that was supposed to appear accidental – but obviously wasn't.

RelaxedUnderPressureCooper did what he could with the unruly, uncooperative, disrespectful, raw material at his disposal in the Around the Village team – when it was available. At one stage, his resources were brought to zero, when an alternative soft option of entertainment in the marquee enticed his entire team to go AWOL. One competitor sprained an ankle, but such was the frenetic pace, he could not remember when the actual injury had occurred. FixitWalsh came in bleeding after being hit in

the face by – he said the Toss the Bale bar, but perhaps he was just covering for a frustrated competitor. Either way, some form of body armour is needed to run this event.

In the Tug of War, the Under 13s Team beat the pathetic adults.

And so it ended.

When push came to shove, the five other teams could not match the thrusting competitiveness of the Parslows team, which retained the coveted Fun Day trophy with a decisive lead.

Andy Gower offered a prayer of thanks. Andy had been invited – as the person least likely to cheat during the games – to judge the table decorations, although judging by the prevailing standards, even this might be optimistic. In keeping with the emphasis on water sports, the first prize went to Backlands for its "Titanic" theme. The Around the Village theme of "The Italian Job" was reinforced by a drive around the village and subsequent arrival of 3 Minis. Switching on an electric convector fan as a last minute attempt by Parslows to simulate "Gone with the Wind" did not quite cut the mustard!

Had there been a Fair Play Award, Backlands would confidently have awarded this honour to itself. Some of the other teams might disagree with this conclusion.

News from Speen Baptist Church

Andy writes:

On Saturday 15th May there was a change from our usual venue for the Ladies Breakfast because I had forgotten to book Speen Village Hall. Instead, over 50 ladies met for breakfast in Speen Chapel hall to hear Emmy Wilson, Pastoral Director for the Holy Trinity Church Brompton, speak of her work in



prisons. Emmy shared several deeply moving and challenging stories about God's love and power in action changing lives and bringing hope to those in despair. Holy Trinity is the home of the Alpha Course and Alpha Courses now run in 135 of 165 prisons in England and Wales.



One of the great celebrations in church family life occurs when a person comes to faith in Jesus Christ and decides to be baptised. On Sunday 23rd May there were two baptisms to celebrate – Anne Stevens from North Dean and David Fradgley from Walters

Ash. Before being baptised Anne and David told the congregation about their journeys to faith. The original Greek meaning of the word 'baptism' is 'to immerse', so that is what we do. Anne was first into the pool. And after making her public declaration of faith she was immersed



(symbolising dying to her old way of life) and then raised from the water (symbolising a new start - rising to life a new life with Christ).

David followed Anne into the pool, and after affirming his faith, was also baptised.

Baptism is doubly symbolic; both dying and rising to a new life, but also of being washed

clean from all the guilt and wrong things which we have done.

The North Dean Ward Revisited

On my recent visit to Uganda I was able to break with my Workaid work and visit the North Dean Ward at the Bishop Asili Health Centre in Luwero. I was delighted to find that things had really moved forward in the last year.

The plan during the nineties was to start a Home Care Service for HIV patients, run from the Health Centre. Unfortunately this did not happen for various reasons. Then in late 1999 the people of North Dean decided they would like to help Sister Ernestine by raising the funds for a new HIV/Aids ward, as one of the ways the village would mark the Millennium. In 2000 I went out for three months to organise and help build the ward.

From the time it was finished in April 2000 until March of last year, 2003, the ward was not used as originally intended, but as a general ward. In 2001 we heard that there was a vague possibility of funds coming from the Catholic Relief Services for an Aids programme to run from the Centre including home care, but vague it continued to be.

In 2002, with the residue of the funds from the ward account, I was able to add a covered walk way from the North Dean Ward to the main building. This was a necessity as in the rainy season the rain comes down like stair rods and nurses could be soaked in ten yards!


During these years a number of important people had visited the Health Centre and seen the improvements that had taken place and this attracted funds to build a new Maternity Ward, which was badly needed.

Then at the end of 2002 I heard that the money was near to being given, and in March of last year the AIDS programme started. I am delighted to say that the North Dean Ward then came into its own. It is now the centre of the programme, with the office holding all the records of AIDS patients. The very sick are brought in and treated free of charge. When they return home there are now Outreach Health Workers working from six small clinics set up in strategic places in the bush to care for patients in their homes.

It has been a privilege to work with the Sisters over the years, watching what I term the outworking of God's plan for the widows, orphans and the destitute of Luwero. During these years I have seen and been part of many things that have happened that go far beyond anything that could be called coincidence. Even the way things came together to build the ward were nothing short of a miracle, nothing went wrong and that alone is almost unheard of for Africa. For me personally building the ward was not just a three month event, but a complete Christian story that I would be very happy to tell if anyone was interested to listen.

To conclude, I feel we can say wholeheartedly that for those who had the vision to help a Third World country as part of North Dean's marking of the 2000 Millennium, and to those who contributed, the building of the North Dean ward in Uganda has been an unqualified success and will stand for many years to come.




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Speen WI News Report


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



Dear Editor

Having read the recent issue of Speen & North Dean News, where in your Editor's Note you talk about the lack of young members on the Speen and North Dean Committees and the lack of support from the village, I have a few comments and suggestions.

I think the trouble is that there really isn't a community feel to villages these days. People work very hard and don't have time to spare. The old notion of going to the pub or village hall to meet and spend an evening together has vanished into the past because you can be entertained at home with the TV, computer games, etc. And with the introduction of the internet and email, people don't talk so much either. They send texts, they email - look at me I've sent you an email rather than picking up the phone. So how is anyone supposed to have a community spirit when we're all shut away in our homes?

I think to build a community the villagers have to find out who their fellow villagers (not just immediate neighbours) are and get them together. Some ideas I've had are:

A Register of Business

I think a great way to bring people together is to find out what each villager does for a living. You could collate a register and publish it every few months as a supplement to the newsletter. Then, when someone needs a plumber, or a website designer or florist, etc villagers might look in their local 'directory' first and contact someone in the village. It could help everyone get to know each other.

The Marketplace

Do you think the villagers whose hobbies are pottery, sewing, etc or those who grow plants and vegetables, make jams, cakes, etc would get together to sell their products at the village hall on a regular basis? I think people may like locally made organic food and products (like the stained glass chap and Beechdean Dairy). Each buyer and seller would pay a small entrance fee for hall funds. Of course, this sounds like a bring and buy sale but you need to call it something grander, like 'The Marketplace'.

The Speen & North Dean News

In the Bucks Free Press, they have a section called 'Teen Talk', written by a schoolgirl. She talks

about all sorts of subjects and it's a great insight into what teenagers are thinking about and a refreshing change. Would it be a good idea to introduce something similar? It might encourage other youngsters to write articles too. Perhaps the newsletter could do with some input from the younger generation. Maybe you could introduce a kids page with kids and teenagers articles, puzzles, small competitions, etc just to get the local children to read the newsletter too. I'm sure you would find companies willing to donate prizes, as the community is always a good cause and good for PR!

Games Swap/Buy

I notice Speen have a junior club. Do you think a regular kids games swap or sale session at the hall would be fun and help to get the kids together? Again, there could be a small entrance fee to the hall.

I've only lived in the village for a couple of years, so these ideas may have already been tried, so please excuse me if I'm repeating ideas that have already been suggested.

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PETER COLLETT (1936-2004)

Peter, who died earlier this year of cancer, was a man who made a significant contribution the local community behind the scenes. He was born in High Wycombe, one of five children, and educated at the RGS. His father worked for the Borough as a gardener, which probably gave Peter his love of gardening. He was an accountant who worked locally for Parker Knoll, Austin Hoy, Reldan, and Elga. He married Barbara in 1983 and they bought Quintilian in Hampden Road because it had a large garden.

They soon joined the Speen Horticultural Society and Peter was a committee member from then on, helping with the Fetes and other events. A keen cricketer, he played for Westbourne Street and Wye Valley. He also played league table tennis for Apollo at North Dean and then captained Little Missenden. He audited the Speen Playing Field Association's accounts for many years.

He was best known in Speen as the organiser and main collector of the Playing Field Draw, and for being seen walking their Golden Retriever, Magnum, around the Village.

A Trip down Memory Lane

It's bluebell time again and my thoughts always turn to Bryants Bottom. My grandparents lived in one of the pair of flint cottages next to the chapel.

Granddad would say I'm going up to the wood to get a faggot. For anyone that doesn't know, a faggot is a bundle of bean sticks with the bark thinly stripped off one and bound round the middle of the bundle making it easier to carry them home.

We would pick bluebells in the wood and cowslips off the bank. The family didn't have cars in those days; we used to get Farmer's bus from Frogmore to Bryants Bottom. We then

went up the bank, through the wood and down to North Dean to visit my aunt Lillie. Granny's sister Claire kept the William IV pub at Speen - I think it was after the First World War but I'm not very good on dates. My sister, like me loved the area so much she and her husband built a bungalow in Bryants Bottom. Their daughter started school in 1962, a dear little school at Hampden. She was asked at the start, "would you like to put your name on the skin list?" Meaning, would you like to take your turn to eat the skin off the custard! Is that politically correct? No matter, they were such happy days.


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FUN DAYS RECALLED

Another Fun Day in Speen. They didn't happen like that when I was a child. Oh, we had Christmas and Easter and Guy Fawkes Night and general outings and celebrations, but apart from time taken up by lessons and basic domestic chores - which earned us our pocket money - our time was our own. And I never remember feeling bored.

Life was much simpler. When I was very small we didn't even have a radio, never mind a TV or a computer. We had a sandpit and a swing. For wet days we had pencils, crayons and paints, like children nowadays, but we also had doll-dressing books and blunt-ended scissors to cut out pictures from magazines. We had plasticine which began in pretty separate colours and ended in dismal grey streaks.

Starting at the Infants School was fun. Meeting all those new children, chatting and larking about as we walked there and back together, the best part of a mile each way. Our mothers never accompanied us after the first week or so. Motor traffic before the war was quite rare and no-one ever warned us to beware of strangers, or needed to do so.

In the playground the small girls were introduced to singing games, while boys bowled hoops or kicked footballs around. Who remembers "In and out the bluebell windows" or "Poor Jenny sits a-weeping" or "The farmer wants a wife"? Those songs told stories and often involved choosing individuals to play particular parts. Goodness knows how old they were, even then!

Skippping and ball games developed different skills. It was gratifying to be able to skip, backwards as well as forwards, without tripping over the rope. Then the further advance - jumping into, or out of, a long turning rope with other girls, without spoiling the rhythm or interrupting the chanted verses. Catching and throwing balls was a challenge to boys as well as girls. Marbles had their season, then parts of the playground were marked off into squares with chalk for hopscotch, or wooden tops were coloured or covered with silver paper to enhance their appearance as they spun.

Out of school hours we played in the avenue with our friends, under the lighted gas-lamps on dark evenings. We were a mixed group, roughly as many boys as girls and we enjoyed rounders or "It", or ran races, then held a rope for a game of "Higher and higher". The competition was quite fierce and arguments would arise, but fights were rare. Then, always to our regret, our mothers would appear and say it was bedtime.

During school holidays some of us would walk

for miles into the nearby countryside, exploring, climbing trees, leaping over streams, daring each other to attempt things which could have been dangerous in retrospect - but which we managed to survive. We would invariably arrive home late for dinner, hungry and thirsty - and very dirty.

Then, as we grew older - stimulated perhaps by pantomime or school plays - we had great fun acting out scenes which we devised for ourselves. We created costumes out of old curtains and cast-off clothing and hats - such as my grandpa's black topper, which was a real hit! My Uncle Walter donated a splendid collection of grease paints, a false beard and a handle-bar moustache and I stitched some yellow floss onto a bathing cap to make a wig. One of the boys fancied himself as the heroine with blonde hair and an excessive amount of lipstick - even though he was taller than all of us! While Patrick, wearing a grey metal basin on his head and brandishing a wooden sword, rushed about calling "Et tu Brute! The barbarians are coming to attack Rome!" This phase lasted all of one summer and included related effects to accompany performances, like the comb-and-tissue-paper band:

"We're all together now - all together now!

Tiddly pom, tiddly pom, tiddly pom pom pom!"

There was a tentative venture into opera, which was limited by our lack of first-hand experience but, after initial resistance and some fooling around, we girls managed to persuade the boys to learn a couple of folk-dances - "Flowers of Edinburgh" and "Christchurch Bells" - which we succeeded in performing quite passably on the lawn to a record on the gramophone.

On wet days and winter evenings we would play card games, like Pontoon, or Draughts or Monopoly. That was enjoyable and, although cheating was not unknown, it was usually half-serious and meant to test the vigilance of the other players. Martin, who fancied himself was a potential financier, always refused to be declared bankrupt and devised endless schemes to frustrate that possibility.

And then, should we be playing around the kitchen table in the Costain household at nine o'clock of an evening, Mary and Joan's father - a Physics Master at a local school - would come in from their living-room, open the back-door wide, and say with finality, "Goodnight!"

There was no arguing. We had no option but to slink off home!

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District and County Council News May 2004

During the past few months progress has been made with both the **Speed Limit Review** and the **Tranquil Project (Quiet lanes)** projects. From the initial work to collate data, initial proposals have been brought forward for informal consultation through various exhibitions held in April. Those attending will have seen that for Speen & North Dean several changes are proposed. Significantly 30mph is proposed from Chapel Hill through to North Dean taking out the short length of derestricted road between the villages. An extension to the Hampden Road is also proposed to extend to Coleheath Bottom. At present all proposals are subject to further formal consultation with the Parishes in August this year and subject to satisfactory outcomes implementation should commence late 2004 or early 2005.

As part of the Tranquil Project I will also be taking up the issue of inappropriate vehicles using and damaging the lanes. This was graphically illustrated when a 40t articulated truck tried to negotiate the Devil's Elbow, failed completely blocking access in both directions. It took two heavy recovery vehicles several hours to sort out the problem that has left damage to the kerbing at this point.

Green Waste Collection

You will have seen from the local press that the decision by Wycombe District Council to pilot Green Waste collections together with Dry Recyclables has been made. The pilot, based on alternate weekly collections of Green and Refuse waste, is to take place over a two-year programme and will include some 12,000 homes in the South of the District. As support from this Ward appeared to favour the recycling of glass and plastics I have asked the Council to look at the possibility of introducing collections of Dry Recyclables in the rural areas. I have also asked that they consider the possibility of introducing local composting facilities on

redundant farm land as proposed by the County Council's Minerals and Waste Deposit Local Plan; this could save the cost of the collection of Green waste and avoid the introduction of two weekly refuse collections. If you have a view on this idea I would like to hear from you so that I might pass it on to the Council.

Local Safety Schemes

In response to complaints about the length of grass etc in verges I have asked the County Council to ensure that grass cutting is undertaken as a priority especially where vision is affected at junctions. I would hope that by the time you read this action has been taken.

A new safety initiative launched by the County Council is 'Highways on Call'. This gives a single access contact number 0845 230 2882 to deal with problems with roads and pavements. If you do notice defects with the local highways then please use this number to report them and action will be taken.


Community Leaders Fund

DAN RIDGLEY'S FIELD

The rotary mower did not give a very good quality cut and was becoming unreliable, so a used replacement costing £10,000 has been purchased. This is doing a much better job which, hopefully, will encourage more use of the Field for rounders, cricket etc. Much appreciated help with funding is coming from the Parish Council, the Shop Charity and the Millennium Fund.

Another working party took place on 3rd April when 20 villagers again did a marvellous job

cutting back hedges, reseeding the bonfire area, repairing the patio in front of the pavilion, cleaning the Pavilion and filling a hole in the hedge by the small children's areas. A new notice board was erected by the field entrance. The major task was the erection of a basketball hoop and backboard on a stand for use by older children (*see picture on front page*). This involved digging a metre cube hole - done single-handed by a well-known Norwegian!



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
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News from St John's Parish Church

General News

Just over a year has passed since the Licensing by the Bishop of Buckingham and Installation by the Archdeacon of Buckingham of the Revd Denise Critchell as Vicar of Lacey Green and Minister in the Risborough Team. During this time we have seen the church continuing to grow with new ideas and thoughts as to how best it can serve the local community. Denise is being greatly supported by her husband Norman. The traditional Lenten services – Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday and Easter Sunday - were all well attended.

Some other events of note were:

- On Tuesday, 24th February 2004, a record number of over 70 people went to St John's School to enjoy the traditional annual Pancake Party. With some 35 children to entertain, the Games-Master Graham King was kept fully occupied, while in the kitchen, the dads were at full stretch (under the watchful supervision of mums!) in providing for the demands of the hungry hordes! The evening concluded with a time-honoured dads pancake tossing competition, which was hotly contested as usual and won by Hugh Thomas-Davies!!
- On Sunday 29th February 2004, under the leadership of Gavin Mole, the St John's Church Choir were joined by friends and members of the congregation to stage 'Two Parable in Music' - the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. The audience was encouraged to join in the singing and given some very amusing warm-up exercises at the beginning. Although this was not seen as a fund raising event, a retiring collection of £100 was taken.
- During the March (2nd) Meeting of the PCC it was agreed that a proportion of its charitable giving would go to supporting a Crosslinks family – Sena and Jane Ounate-Lare – who are preparing for a Church Planting Ministry in Togo. They plan to be based in Dapaong (30,000) and their vision is to reach out to students and educated workers in the town.
- On Friday, 5th March 2004, women from all the parishes within the local area attended an interdenominational Service at St John's to mark the Women's World day of Prayer. As in previous years, the service was well supported

and provided much spiritual strength to face the challenges of daily life. The Guest Speaker was the Revd Janice Pettipher, a local Methodist Minister, who spoke about her life and experiences in South Africa.

- The church was full with mums, dads and children for the Family Eucharist Service for Mothering Sunday (21st March 2004). During the service the children presented their mothers with small posies of flowers.
- On Sunday, 3rd April 2004, the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) took place following the Palm Sunday service. In addition to the usual resolutions and elections associated with the PCC, the congregation received detailed reports on all the key areas of parish management. A copy of the draft Minutes from the AGM will be available on the church notice board in due course.
- On Friday, 23rd April 2004, over 150 people attended a Health & Beauty Therapy Evening organised by Doreen Lett in the Lacey Green Village Hall in aid of the St John's Church Restoration and Extension Fund. A wide range of professional presentations and demonstrations took place together with health and beauty products to try and purchase. Over a £1000 was raised through personal donations to the church project.
- On Saturday, 29th May 2004, some 24 hardy folk spent the morning working on the church grounds and graveyard. Hedges and grass were trimmed, weeds removed and graves repaired. A reward of bacon rolls and coffee were well deserved by all who volunteered for the work.

Restoration Fund

At a recent meeting of the PCC it was agreed that the operating surplus from the general account should be set aside for restoration purposes. This, together with the existing balance and receipt of regular small donations still coming in, leaves around £4,800 in the fund. The Church Fabric Committee is now prioritising the outstanding minor repairs, and work on these will begin shortly - much of this to be on a 'self-help' basis. In the longer term, the church building needs to be re-wired.

Wildlife Watch by Peter Symonds

The most notable sightings over the past couple of months seem to have been of roe deer within our area. Previous articles have referred to various sightings of these attractive deer passing through our area but the number of recent sightings seem to suggest that we may have at least two, if not more, residents. Recent reports have included a pair in North Dean and individuals in Speen and at Redland End from sightings by three different observers. The Speen report referred to a "startled male roe deer" in one of the larger gardens in Grubbins Lane.

The amphibians in the village have been breeding since the last issue of the News. Frogs assembled during February, spawning in early March. In my own pond numbers were well down on previous years - possibly the result of early morning visits by the Heron. Lower frog numbers seemed to be offset by increasing numbers of toads (which I believe may be unpalatable to the Heron). Strings of toad spawn appeared in two of our ponds during late March. This duly hatched but, strangely, in mid-May a limited second breeding cycle was apparent. In May, as in March, our pond has echoed to the sound of mating calls, audible from indoors. Other regular visitors to our

ponds early in the year are a pair of Mallard who almost seem to be looking for a nest site. One year they laid an egg by the side of the pond but in most years they decide that a garden shared with a bearded Collie is just too crowded!

Other birds are busy breeding at this time. Pied Wagtails were noted nest building to the rear of The King William IV. Within our own garden Hedge sparrows have already fledged, whilst two boxes of Blue Tits and one box of Great Tits are a hive of activity. Our summer visitors are now here with Chiffchaffs noted in the woods in early April with several Back caps noted towards the end of the month.

In May one regular occurrence at night is the sound of Cockchafer crashing into illuminated windows at night. These large brown beetles emerge from their larval stage underground during the night but are often disorientated by bright lights. Most years, several of these large [35cm] beetles crash into our floodlights during May- hence their alternative name of May bugs.

Please let me know of any interesting sightings or indeed photographic opportunities.
