

Memories of Speen

Jo Rainbow lived in Speen from 1982 until 1993. She nearly became a GP at Cross Keys Surgery in Princes Risborough, but ended up specialising in Paediatrics. Her training took her to Australia and then she met the man brave enough to become her husband. Jo now lives in Orange, NSW – 250Km west of Sydney – and is concentrating on practical Paediatrics, raising Sophie and Jack.

Speen was stultifying for a teenager in the 1980s. I appreciated that it was a pretty place to live, but there was nothing to do – other than walking the dog and trying to convince the landlord of the King William that you were old enough to buy a lemonade. I could not wait to escape to university. Coming home during vacations was pleasant – the opportunity to do your washing for free was never to be foregone and I quite like my parents. However, after a few days, the feeling of ennui would come flooding back.

I duly escaped and now, living in Australia, it is arguable whether I could have escaped much further. But I have returned for a holiday with my Australian husband and two young children, and I now see Speen quite differently.

On returning from Australia there is always the surprise at how green and lush the countryside is. You may think you are in drought, but it is nothing compared to rural NSW - now entering its seventh consecutive year! There is also the recognition of oncefamiliar sounds such as birdsong and Radio 4, which make an ex-pat quite wistful. Then there are the changes to the village, which may have been gradual but make Speen markedly different to me.

The most obvious one is the new appearance of Hampden Road. More houses have appeared with in-filling, and the pub was closed. I did not realise the loss of my custom would have such a profound effect!

The gardens seem better maintained. Maybe the village is home to more ardent gardeners. Or maybe I have lived in drought for so long, that I forget the splendour of the English country garden.

The playing fields are much improved. The new arrangement is a sensible use of the space, and provides greater variety of play equipment. My kids just love the playground for littlies, as well as the larger slide and swings. I am glad that the safety Police did not prevail and that rocking toys and the roundabout still exist. I am also pleased about the development of a bike track — at last, something for bored teenagers!

Finally, and most happily, the village seems to have acquired a greater community spirit. Back then, there was only the fête, the WI Christmas carols and the village raffle. Now there are more communal events such as the village play, Speen Arts Week, the alternative World Cup, which involve all age groups and can be housed in the magnificent village marquee. This publication reflects this inclusive attitude, and belies the sulky teenager moan of "Nothing ever happens in Speen".

Despite all these improvements, this former sulky teenager would not return permanently to Speen. We could not afford to maintain the standard of living we enjoy in Orange. Besides, our local vineyards, restaurants and golf courses are more plentiful. In addition, rural Australia is a great place to bring up children – unpolluted, spacious and fabulous weather; coupled with an excellent education system.

Yet my children have British passports so they can enjoy the best of both worlds. I hope they return many times to Speen to appreciate the charm of rural England. If they ask nicely, they might even get their washing done....

Wildlife Watch

Since the last edition we have had the birds' breeding season followed by a very warm summer which has seen butterflies and reptiles faring well locally.

One interesting breeding season record related to a pair of Red Legged Partridge in North Dean. These birds are occasionally seen around the villages being generally associated with open countryside. However in North Dean a pair had chosen not only to nest in a private garden but also to actually built their nest adjacent to the house within about three feet of the front door. All was progressing well with a new egg added every morning until the clutch reached 12 and the contents were removed before proper incubation could get under way. The culprit was not identified.

This happened before the end of May. Whether it was purely a coincidence or whether the same birds then tried again in Bryants Bottom I am not sure, but on an early morning drive through Bryants Bottom at the end of June I saw movements on the road ahead. About 12 tiny Red Legged Partridge chicks, which could only have just hatched, were being led by their mother out of a front garden and marched towards the open fields. Unfortunately as the chicks innocently walked up the middle of the road two at the back were snatched away by Magpies, but hopefully some should have survived.

The hot weather of July saw a good number of butterflies. In particular, the rare Purple Emperor butterfly has been recorded in Speen again. I had a brief sighting of one in our garden and Jeremy Symondson recorded one at the Bike Park on July 9th. Meanwhile Martin Stockley recorded 12 species in his garden in late July including Marbled Whites, Small Coppers and also a quite scarce Silver Washed Fritillary. Prior to this he had also reported Purple Hairstreaks within his garden, another uncommon specimen. Humming Bird Hawk moths and Painted Lady butterflies which both migrate from the continent

have again been recorded.

Reptiles are uncommon around our villages but in the warm conditions sightings have been recorded. Louise Wilson reported a Slow Worm basking outside the chapel at the end of May. A new record received is of sightings of Grass Snakes with five sightings from Spring Coppice Lane. These records followed the find of a discarded snake skin towards Prestwood. The skin which was probably shed by a female was over three feet long. These snakes are harmless and fully protected by the law.

With the summer now over one would expect our birds to have finished their breeding cycles, and indeed most have. However, in August a pair of Wood Pigeons started to construct a typical flimsy nest in one of our trees. The first egg hatched on 4th September and the parents are still rearing their young at the time of writing.

The Millennium Marquee has been put away for the winter after four village hirings and two private hirings during the summer. After insurance and repair costs, about £1400 has been added to the fund for it's eventual replacement. The marquee was three years old when bought in 2000. It will probably need replacing or major refurbishment in about three years time. Grateful thanks to the many village volunteer

Down on the Farm

Many of our friends tell us that their jobs are boring! Boredom is unknown in farming: one never knows what each day will bring, let alone each week or month. This summer has been no exception. We have had to cope with too much rain (bringing the animals back into the barns in May to avoid killing all the waterlogged grass), drought conditions in July (feeding full winter rations when animals should be living on grass), and then in August, back to the old wet regime. All of this interspersed with the usual variety of problems which seem to crop up regularly: difficult calvings, animals being chased through a fence by dogs (one heifer was actually killed), and leaking water pipes (we try to mend them rather more quickly than the water boards). The most trying problem is the plethora of inspectors who visit us regularly and demand to see all the animals, the whole farm and every bit of paperwork. They need to be accompanied by Charles as the farmer: the last visit from the cattle registration inspector took 5 days!

We made some excellent hay in June but after that the grass ceased to grow. In July the cereals harvest was good. One field yielded the biggest amount of grain we have achieved in 40 years. We are now ready to harvest the maize. The plants are not nearly as tall as usual but the cobs are well filled. We cut the whole plant with a forage harvester and ensile it. This involves packing the chopped maize into clamps, squashing it with a tractor and covering the clamp with

black polythene to exclude the air. The product will keep for years and can be used for winter feed and in times of summer drought. Fine weather is necessary for this operation, if only to keep the mud off the road. At the end of September we are selling all the Holstein/ Friesian black and white cattle. The sale is being held on the farm and hopefully buyers will come from far and wide The last big sale on the farm was held on October 18th 1926 when Mr Graham Holt-Thomas, the celebrated aircraft engineer, dispersed his herd which

had won numerous prizes at shows all over the country.

Now, more about the ice cream. Andrew and Susie Howard's aim is to produce a luxury brand of traditional English ice cream which is second to none. Within thirteen years Beechdean Dairies has grown from a capacity of 5000 litres per annum to 2.5 million litres of ice cream a year. All the production is still on the farm where the pedigree Jersey herd produce the rich milk needed to make the ice cream.

We estimate that every year some twelve million people enjoy the taste of Beechdean Farmhouse Dairy Ice Cream at venues such as Buckingham Palace Garden Parties, stately homes such as Blenheim Palace or Chatsworth farm shop, leading theatres including the Albert Hall, airline and shipping companies, quality restaurants and selected specialist outlets.

Although the Ice Cream and the Farm are separate businesses, for obvious reasons they work in close cooperation. When potential new customers come to the Dairies they are taken on a Farm Tour. Nowadays, the direct link between primary producer and retailer is regarded as most important, 'provenance' being the Buzz Word.

Speen Bike Park—Update

Following this summer's official opening of the Speen Bike Park, which was well reported in the Bucks Free Press, the Bike Park Team has continued to add further facilities. In addition to the banked track and earth jumps, the youngsters now have a variety of further challenging features to test their biking skills including a seesaw, narrow balancing planks, a raised boardwalk incorporating two chain bridges and finally a suspension bridge.

Other improvements include the provision of benches and permanent signage. Speen Playing Fields has invested in a petrol driven strimmer to enable the grass and vegetation to be kept in good order, and the site is gradually "greening-up" following the initial construction work and the dry summer. Some seeding has been carried out but on the more open parts of the site this will need to be repeated. Work parties over the autumn period will plant the boundary hedge adjacent to the horse paddock, in accordance with the planning consent, and will add mesh to some of the timber features to make them safer for use in damp conditions. Some of the timber features will also need to have more preservative applied. Finally, we will be trying to remove some of the barbed wire from around the small copse area. A rustic looking waste bin is being ordered with the support of the Parish Council and this will be installed as soon as possible.

A huge amount of effort has been put in over the summer by a fairly small team to finish the bike park. The

raised boardwalk in particular and the suspension bridge took many man-hours to complete but we now have a facility which seems to be the envy of other villages, who are now developing plans for their own tracks. Ongoing support will be needed to maintain and possibly improve this facility, particularly from parents of the bikers. Many thanks to everyone who has supported the project so far.

The Bike Park has been well used over the summer holidays by youngsters from within the village and some from further afield. Numerous families from the village have also brought younger children to test out the facilities. Please encourage your children to wear cycling helmets. It could be that our insurers would be able to avoid paying out on a claim if an incident occurred involving youngsters without helmets. Youngsters and novices should practise on the basic track and the low balancing planks before trying out the other features. The seesaw should be tackled slowly until youngsters are used to it. Also please make your children aware that they are not allowed to alter the track themselves. We have had youngsters using spades to alter certain jumps, but any requests for changes or improvements need to be put to the team in charge either through myself or Alistair Blundell. One change we may consider is making the access easier with a V-gate, but this would be immediately closed if there was any misuse of the track by motorised bikes which are strictly prohibited under the conditions of the planning consent.

Speed Limit Review

The new speed limits have now been implemented in Speen, North Dean and surrounding areas. These new limits are to be monitored by the Buckinghamshire County Council to see how effective they are. In 2007 a working group will be meeting to discuss the outcome of the monitoring and to decide whether any further changes are necessary to the speed limits in the area.

If you would like to share your views on the new limits, please feel free to contact me and/or Paul Rogerson, as we will be contacted formally prior to the working group meeting to provide feedback on local views. In respect of Speen, Lacey Green Parish Council will be seeking to get the 30mph limit, which is presently half way up the hill as you enter the village on Hampden Road, moved to the bottom of the hill to align with Coleheath Bottom.

Please be warned that the Thames Valley Police will be carrying out speed checks on individual road engths now that local drivers have now had plenty of time to get used to the new limits.

Kiln Lane

As you are aware, works have been carried out recently to Kiln Lane in the vicinity of the redevelopment of Kingswood House, which has resulted in widening of the lane and a new surface being laid. Several meetings and correspondence has taken place between Buckinghamshire County Council (Rights of Way and Access Department), supported by Lacey Green Parish Council and the new owners of Kingswood House, to try to resolve the situation. To date, the works have not been carried out to the satisfaction of Buckinghamshire County Council, but suffice to say that Lacey Green Parish Council are supporting Buckinghamshire County Council in striving to reach a solution which is agreeable to all parties.

Bollards, Corner of Coleheath Bottom & Chapel Hill, Speen

Unexpectedly, two plastic bollards have been erected by Buckinghamshire County Council on the repaired/ raised bank on the corner of Coleheath Bottom and Chapel Hill (near the Scout hut).

Lacey Green Parish Council views these bollards as unsuitable in a rural situation and Paul Rogerson has supported us in raising these concerns with Buckinghamshire County Council in order to get the bollards removed and replaced, if it is deemed necessary, with something more sympathetic to a rural landscape.

Since 1966, twice each year, in late July and late August ten-day Music Camps have been held on top of Pigotts Hill in North Dean. At each camp some 135 enthusiasts gather making up a symphony orchestra and choir to work on the serious rehearsal of major works, modern and classical, well known and unknown, while living together simply. No-one is paid, costs and chores are shared. These Music Camps were started by my father in 1927 with 35 of his university friends and have continued in unbroken sequence over 79 years, involving many thousands of musicians. There are now many grandchildren and even great grandchildren of early campers at Pigotts!

The second camp this year was the 150th Music Camp and on Bank Holiday Monday some 300 "Campers" of all ages celebrated this, making music and meeting old friends at Pigotts. The afternoon ended with two works from the 1927 programme – Schubert's 'Unfinished Symphony' and the Mozart 'Requiem'. Toasts were drunk to 'Camps Past' and 'Future Camps' – the latter proposed by a cellist who came to Music Camp first in 1933. Over it all three flags flew spelling out '150'. The weather was kind and it was felt that the day was pretty 'sesquicensational'! (cf sesquicentennial').

District and County Council News September 2006

Culverton /Woodway Junction

Recent changes to Government funding for the County Council have resulted in budget difficulties for capital works especially in transport and schools programmes. The removal of Supported Borrowing, where the Government reimbursed the Council for the cost of borrowing, has meant that the road works programme has had to be re-thought. and some schemes have been lost. You may have seen that the proposed improvements in the Woodway / Culverton junction on the A4010 were under threat because of this. It is therefore good news that the scheme is still to go ahead. It is the Council's intention to contact all those who attended the consultation exhibitions in a few weeks time. More detailed information should be available then.

Due to the work being on hold for a number of months the project has lost time. It is intended to re-start land acquisition via negotiation as well as to complete the detailed design and contract information pertaining to the scheme. There are also reports which need to be signed and other formalities to go through, but the scheme is back up and running and will be implemented in 2006/07, subject to land acquisition.

Speed Limit Review /Tranquil

Since the implementation of the SLR the County Council has advised that there will be a further review to look at the success (or not) of the new limits. Some problems have been experienced where the new limits meet the proposed Quiet Lanes. Here the introduction of de-regulation signs has raised concerns that, instead of reducing speed in the proposed Quiet Lanes, the opposite effect is being achieved. This problem has been caused by the delay by Government to issue the required regulations necessary to implement the Quiet Lane Programme. It was not until September that these regulations were released and it has now been found that before any work can be undertaken a further comprehensive consultation exercise will have to be undertaken, since the one carried out within the Speed Limit Review will not conform to the new regulations. If you do have any comments on the Speed Limits you wish to be considered in the review then make then please email them to Pat Francis using pfran-cis@bucksscc.gov.uk with a copy to me. If you do not have email then I would be pleased to pass them on for you.

However it is not all bad news as the Village Entry Treatments are being progressed through the Tranquil project where Parishes have requested them. In addition to the White Gates, an Oak Feature is being offered to the parishes that combines the village nameplate with the speed limit and Chilterns AONB logo. As yet there are no plans to introduce these in Speen but I have asked the Parish Council to consider a request should the prototype be acceptable.

Waste Collections.

The Grow Scheme has been in place for over 18 months now and has included two summers. If you have any comments on the way the scheme is performing then I would like to hear from you. In particular, any comments on the effectiveness of the new plastic collection and its impact on reducing the amount of Grey Waste on the two weekly cycle. If you are having difficulties coping with the two weekly cycle, and are recycling all you can, then you may qualify for a larger bin.

If you have any concerns regarding District and County Council issues, would like more information, or have noticed areas where action is needed, then please let me know and I will do what I can to help.

I was born on 19th August 1945 in Loudwater and I went to school there until at 11+ years I moved to Wooburn. I left school in 1960, aged 15, and worked in the furniture trade until 1987, when I joined the Post Office. I've done a number of different duties –

walking, collections, driving across counties and deliveries.

I work from 5:00am 'till 1pm every day. There are some nasty letter boxes and one nearly took the end off my finger—I had to have 5 stitches. Some of the females are reluctant to come to the door in the morning as they may not be dressed—won't say which ones as I don't want to spoil a good thing! I have been on this round for four years now and I hope to stay on it till I retire in 2010. You get to know your customers very well. You have to watch out for dogs on rural deliveries as they are outside more than on town walks, plus you run into the odd cow! But the good thing about rural rounds is that you're out in the country and people always speak. The worst part is getting up at 4am. The best part is finishing at 1pm—all afternoon off!

This was the lowest point of our adventure — but our spirits were lifted by the arrival of the Speen support crew , Mary Craft and Nikki Allen!

The play is presented by the locally based Ubiquitous Touring Theatre Company with a 16 strong cast which includes four members of the Wilson family from North Dean - Louise, James, Emma and Alice - and, from Speen, John Allwright. Speen's Marjorie Stockley directs, Sandy Mitcheson is in charge of costumes and the script and songs are written by Martin Stockley. "Ubiquitous" toured the show locally 6 years ago with great success, but it did not visit Speen, so here is a chance to become re-acquainted with all the familiar characters from this timeless story including the miserly Scrooge, Tiny Tim, Bob Cratchit - and, of course, several ghosts!

Dickens wrote A Christmas Carol in 1843 and it appears to be partially based on his own personal experiences. He was born into a poor family in Portsmouth in 1812, the second of seven children, and when his father was thrown into a debtors' prison the destitute family was forced to move into prison with the father. Dickens had to work hard from an early age to scrape a living, working 12 hours a day as a boy

in a shoe polish factory. At 15 he became a solicitor's clerk (cf Bob Cratchit, clerk to Scrooge and Marley's accountancy practice) before turning to journalism and subsequently writing fiction for a living. Cratchit's house is thought to have been based on Dickens' own boyhood home. His brother was known as "Tiny Fred" and the character of Cratchit's beloved son Tiny Tim probably has some basis in Dickens' real life handicapped nephew. A Christmas Carol was a huge publishing success and by 1853 Dickens was on tour delivering readings of the story to enthralled audiences. By the mid-1860s he was reading it in America, where in Boston there were queues half a mile long to buy tickets the night before the opening reading, and in New York some 5000 people turned up to get tickets. Sadly, the stress of touring and reading eventually took its toll and Dickens died, exhausted, in 1870, a few months after his final public reading of A Christmas Carol.

Not everyone is quite so familiar with the story. In 2000, this show was performed in a High Wycombe pub known for its "cabaret" acts. Some of the clientele who arrive that night were disappointed to find that Christmas Carol was not, in fact, the name of the stripper for December.

Make a note of the Speen performance dates. Mulled wine, soft drinks and mince pies will be available and tickets will be on sale from early November.

The Chilterns Clock Club is newly formed from the Adult Education Evening Class in Horology that was run by the education authority in Princes Risborough until May this year. The class had run for 16 years but the school decided it could no longer open on Thursday evenings so an alternative was to form a Clock Club using different premises.

Nick Wheeler Robinson immediately offered facilities at Pigotts Music Camp, for which we are eternally grateful. That enabled us to focus on the possibility of a Club based there. The winter parking in the adjacent field was a problem as we only meet from September to April, when the field cannot be relied upon to be usable. Eventually we were able to arrange bookings for 26 Thursday Evenings during the Autumn/Winter at North Dean Village hall, and now we are here and we are a Club.

The Club is for anyone interested in hands-on cleaning, repairing or restoring of any sort of clock. The members share knowledge and skills under the supervision of our Technical Officer who provides specialist help, tools and consumables where needed.

Why are clocks so fascinating? They are attractive and perform a useful function and just maybe they are also worth something as an antique, especially if well restored and in a working condition. The variety seems endless and there are types to suit all tastes.

Do not let the thought of lots of small pieces put you off. It is watches that have the really small parts and a simple clock does not have many parts at all (only 4 wheels in the power train).

Whether you just have a stopped or faulty clock that you would enjoy repairing, or are fascinated by all or specific types or ages of clocks, then you will find help and kindred spirits at the Club.

Our meetings are from 7pm to 9.30pm on Thursday evenings, divided into two terms: 21st September to 14th December 2006, and 4th January to 29 March 2007. Cost per person per term is only £36.00.


