





Scouts are getting older

This year the Scout movement is 100 years old. In Speen we have a really wonderful resource. This hut was built on land donated to the Scout Association by Beatrix Hulton of Chervil Meadow on 28th April 1969. The plot of land had previously changed hands in



1946 for the sum of One Hundred and Twelve Pounds and Ten Shillings. It took another eight years for the village to complete the construction of the Headquarters of the 1st Speen Scout Group which was opened with ceremony on 24th September 1977 and celebrates its 30th Anniversary this year. Just seven years later plans were submitted for an extension at the rear for more storage space and a new committee room. Other forestry land adjacent to the sight also came under control of the Scouts. Many years ago when we moved to Speen, my son went down to the Speen Scout Hut as a Cub Scout, but now there are no Scouts headquartered there as there are no local leaders to lead, although the building is used regularly by the Guides. It is also an outdoor centre for the District. Two local trustees formally look after the estate with the generous assistance of the Guides leader - Pauline Hall and her family. The buildings and land are well maintained as a local resource, both for the Scout and Guide

movements as well as other similar groups. It is available for hire by local residents and has been used by schools for an adventure day. The village of Speen is blessed with some wonderful facilities - notably the Village Hall in the centre of the village (bookings to Sue Taylor on 488500). Sometimes however, the Village Hall may be unavailable or totally unsuitable for the use intended. In these circumstances the Scout Hut might be the answer. The Trustees, together with the District Commissioners, have recently reviewed the kitchen facilities, and decided that they are no longer of an acceptable standard. The planned refurbishment will cost more that the Speen Scouts' coffers contain - so district wide fund raising is to be commenced. I hope it doesn't take as



long as the original building took, to achieve this goal. This is not the only improvement needed, as many residents of Coleheath Bottom know to their cost. Chairman Derek Lewton has met with the council concerning the state of the Coleheath Bottom Bridle Path adjacent to the Scout Hut, and they have agreed to restore the level and improve drainage. Photographic evidence following the summer rains convinced them that continued damage was being done to the surface, but this is not a public highway so the restoration standard required is far lower than it might be otherwise.

In a society where iPods and video games rule, and whilst adults bemoan the lack of imagination in the youth, our teenagers and younger also say that there is 'nothing to do' round here. The bike track is a great

village amenity - and so is the Scout Hut and the land around it. If you want to 'make a difference'in 2007, and can take on the challenge of becoming a leader in the next century of a very proud Scouting movement, then call John Radford on 488679 as a first step have a look at http://



www.scouts.org.uk/ to see what's really going on today.

Speen is top of the class with OFSTED inspectors!

Speen School was visited by an OFSTED inspector at the end of last year and he graded every area of the school either good or outstanding.

This grading was upheld by a further inspection on behalf of the diocese, as Speen is a church school, and by an assessor on behalf of Bucks County Council who gave the school an overall outstanding rating.

In his report, the OFSTED inspector said that the school provided an excellent education for pupils, that achievement was outstanding and that the rich curriculum was one of the main reasons why pupils did so well academically and personally.

Chairman of the governors Amanda Cleaver said: "Although Speen is a small school we believe the pupils should be given just as many, and in some cases more, opportunities to explore and learn. This, coupled with the low pupil/staff ratio, currently about one member of staff to eight pupils, enables the children to reach their full potential"

The leadership and management of the school were also praised by the inspector. This is the second time in five years that the school has received a glowing report and the inspector attributed its continuing success to outstanding leadership.

Amanda Cleaver said: "This report is also a great tribute to the staff who work tirelessly to maintain these high standards."

As part of an ongoing plan to ensure the continued success of the school, work will start in April on a new staff room.

To enhance the environment, the school has recently taken part in a tree planting scheme in conjunction with the Woodland Trust.

Parish Council News January/February 2007

Bollards, Corner of Coleheath Bottom & Chapel Hill, Speen

Speed Limit Review

A working group meeting has been held by Buckinghamshire County Council to review feedback and to review the new speed limits that have now been implemented in Speen, North Dean and surrounding areas. The County Council's view seems to be that they are successful and sees no reason to amend those implemented in our local area. However, the Parish Council has expressed the view that the 30mph limit, presently half way up the hill as you enter the village on Hampden Road, be moved to past the bottom of the hill to near the bend before you arrive at the intersection of Coleheath Bottom. If you are of a like mind, it would help the Parish's case if as many as possible write to Pat Francis at pfrancis@buckscc.gov.uk with their views. If this happens, then there will be evidence for a change and this will help when it comes to making any alterations.

On a more serious note, as forewarned previously, a Speed Indication Device (SID) has been used to record the speed of vehicles in our villages. The Police have been concerned to record the number of people speeding over 30 mph with a large proportion over 35

mph. The Police are now going to be stepping up their operation to enforce the speed limits. The Parish Council is concerned that so many people seem to be flaunting the law and would ask local people to respect their villages and safeguard local inhabitants by keeping to these new speed limits.

Parish Council Elections May 2007

May 2007 sees elections for many parish and town councils across the country. In recent years it has become increasingly difficult to encourage participation in the democratic process at all levels of government.

Election information will shortly be available from local councils to help achieve greater participation in local politics, both by encouraging individuals to stand for election and everyone to vote in local council elections. The information will cover the functions of parish and town councils, their responsibilities and powers, the role of parish and town councillors, and it answers frequently asked questions on candidacy.

If you would like to stand as a councillor for Lacey Green Parish Council then you can seek advice from the Clerk to the Council, George Crombie on 01494 488420. There are 2 councillor positions for Speen and 5 for Lacey Green. Some of the existing councillors will be not be standing again at the election and in fact after 30 years George Crombie is retiring as Clerk to the Council. If anyone would wish to take up this salaried post, please contact George Crombie for more information.

To his relief, it was a man and not one of the many elderly ladies who shopped with him. The man was Freddie Latchford, insurance broker at large whose branch offices were the local pubs. Everyone knew and liked Freddie. Robin now addressed him. "Freddie", he said, "f*** off". Freddie looked startled. "Oh, alright" he said and left the shop. The Green Shield men did likewise, never to return.

busy as usual. This brought in a healthy £495.26. Then, as November ended and December began, we had a visit from The Ubiquitous Theatre Company who gave us a wonderful musical version of Charles Dickens's "The Christmas Carol" with the script and songs written by our own Martin Stockley. The company were touring various of the local Village Halls and we were privileged to have them in ours for two nights completely selling out and adding a further £554.75 to our funds.

Down on the Farm

You will have noticed probably that there are no longer any black and white cattle in our fields. Our sale took place in September as arranged at Home Farm, when over three hundred cattle were sold individually in about five hours, presenting quite a feat of organisation for Charles and the auctioneers. As always on these occasions, some of the animals made good prices and others went far too cheaply in our opinion! (rather like a sale of household effects) Unlike inanimate objects however, we were selling our friends—the results of over thirty five years of selected breeding; but as always in farming, one must look forward and try to forget the unpleasant parts.

Three weeks later we moved the Jersey herd from Old House Farm down to Home Farm (having made a few improvements and modifications). This exercise took place at mid-day when traffic was at a minimum and was greatly enjoyed by all of the cows and by the farm staff with valuable assistance from a large contingent from the Ice Cream team! The herd is now well settled into its new surroundings where it has more space and a covered feeding area which is very beneficial in wet weather. Domestic animals do not mind the cold but they hate wet weather such as we have been having this January.

We are not the only family to be selling dairy cows, by the end of the winter two more herds will have disappeared from the area - one from Stokenchurch, the other from Holmer Green. The low price of milk is responsible for this exodus, most farmers are receiving from 17-19p/litre of milk which is 2p/litre below their costs of production, so obviously this state of affairs cannot continue. Pressure on the supermarkets appears to have no effect and what is particularly irritating is that they

sell bottled water for twice as much as milk.

The situation is rapidly becoming serious for two main reasons. 1) whilst there is little likelihood of there being a shortage of milk used for liquid consumption, soon there will be shortage of milk for cheese and butter which will then have to be imported. 2) more importantly, a lack of grazing animals will result in pasture reverting to scrub and losing all the downland flowers that everyone is trying hard to preserve. Grazing is the only effective way of preserving pasture. Go and look at Andrew Stubbings' Farm at Bradenham. He has permissive footpaths round his fields where he is attempting to nurture a downland flora by cutting each year; but where the pussy willow is rapidly taking over in the fields which have been managed in this way for the longest time.

Winter is the least pleasant time of the year for the farm worker. Much of the work has to be done in the dark and this year one has always ended up soaking wet. It is little comfort to hear that we no longer have a hose pipe ban!

District and County Council News—January 2007

Kiln Lane Restoration

The issue of the surfacing treatment to part of Kiln Lane has been the subject of much debate recently. Concerns over the placing of a concrete strip along a substantial part of the lane leading up to Lacey Green and its removal has been the subject of many meetings and discussions between the developer, the Parish Council and BCC Rights of Way. It had been thought that agreements about the nature of the reinstatement had been reached, but these have subsequently failed to be implemented by the developer. After further discussion and agreement with the Parish Council, the Rights of Way Officers have taken the position that the developer should complete the construction of the replacement dwelling and, prior to occupation, reinstate the lane to the agreed standard that includes the removal of the contentious concrete strip. Failure to comply would result in legal action being taken. In the interim period it is for the developer to keep the lane in a condition that is fit for walkers and equestrians.

Coleheath Bottom

In response to residents' concerns over the degrading and flooding of the lane, the County Council has agreed to carry out repairs to the lane by the Scout Hut. I am told that an order has been placed so the work should be carried out shortly. This is addition to the work carried out at the entrance to the lane last year to lessen the effects of surface water flooding from Chapel Hill. Having raised the matter with BCC, the white plastic posts have been replaced with a more suitable timber post.

Property Spy

Wycombe District Council are now posting 'Buyer Beware' notices on these sites where land has been bought by a speculator and sold off through the internet in small parcels with the encouragement that they may, one day, be granted planning permission. Many sites have been treated in this way and include Church Lane Lacey Green and land to the rear of Bryant's Bottom. If you notice any interference with these notices please let Charles Power know at WDC Planning Enforcement (01494 461000), and he will provide new replacement notices.

Speed Limit Review /Tranquil

Work has continued to seek comments from those affected by the review. In Speen the issue of where the extended 30mph limit on Hampden Road should start has been raised. This matter was debated at the initial review where I asked, for safety reasons, for the signage to be put on the

Hampden side on Coleheath Bottom. I was told at that time that this was not possible because the signs, if placed close to Coleheath Bottom, may be obstructed in the hedgerows and to place them at a distance away from the village entry would lose effectiveness. It would be helpful to have your views on this and in particular any information about the dangerous incidents so that these can be used in evidence to support a change. If you have any comments on the new speed limits then please send them to Pat Francis at the County Council (01296 395000). You can also contact Pat using the email address cis@bucksscc.gov.uk with a copy to me. If you do not have email then please give me a call and I would be pleased to pass them on for you. The Tranguil Project has been taken over by County Council for implementation of the Village Entry Treatments (White Gates and Oak Features) and work on the new traditional finger post direction signing is progressing. Progress has been difficult during the handover but a new manager has been appointed which should now mean progress on the ground.

Council Reorganisation

You may have seen recently that the County Council and District Council have, in response to a Government White paper requirement, decided to go for the Pathfinder Option of Enhanced Working. This means that more emphasis will be placed on Community engagement with both councils working together with the parishes. Local issues will be dealt with locally at Cluster meetings, giving a chance for everybody to get involved. The most recent of these was held recently in Longwick, where the public were able to put their views on pressing local issues such as the removal of bus services and the Speed Limit Review.

Culverton /Woodway Junction

The scheme for the road improvements at this junction is progressing with negotiations for land purchase. These negotiations are proceeding well in anticipation of start on site in Spring / Summer 2007.



Ridgley's Field

19 village heroes planted the hedging and a tree, installed a litter bin, and added some anti-skid wire netting on the jumps on the cycle track over two very wet days in January. The Bike Park is now virtually complete, says Peter Symonds, and in line with the planning consent. The SPF committee has discussed suggestions for the

future use of the open part of this Field. It has concluded that it should be made more accessible to children in accordance with Dan Ridgley's legacy conditions. In the short-term a kissing gate will be installed in place of the stile near Studridge Lane and the field left as a meadow with the minimum of cutting. A picnic table will be provided. Your suggestions for the longer term for children's facilities are very welcome.

Playing Field Improvements and Maintenance

Following our invitation, several suggestions were put forward for additional features on the Field. The SPF committee is supporting the proposal to provide an outdoor (concrete) table tennis table, probably at the top of the field. Many thanks to those who made suggestions.

The February storms brought down the 100 ft poplar tree near the children's play area. Fortunately, no damage was done. The tree was sawn up and the brushwood burned. A team of volunteers made logs from the remaining timber and these were sold around the village, so recovering the cost of the sawing up.

Speen Marquee

We have four hirings for the Millennium Marquee for village events in 2007 and two local private hirings. Grateful thanks in advance to the many village volunteer marquee erectors who will be making it all happen.

The Speen Wind Farm

Bite the bullet? Bow to the inevitable? Plan for a world in which we must control carbon emissions in order to survive? This seems to be the stark inescapable reality. Apparently a mere 2°C rise in world average temperatures promises irreversible geophysical changes and massive human suffering; more than 5°C spells cataclysm. Admittedly, the UK is only about 2% of the global problem. However, unless the UK commits itself to radical action, how can we expect the USA, China & India to take proportionately far greater measures?

Wind power represents one of the really green, clean technologies. The UK has one of the most suitable climates in the world to exploit this energy source and, here in the Chilterns, we surely reside in one of the best locations in southern England. One would perhaps have to travel hundreds of miles to find a more suitable area. On the highest land to the north of Speen, the DTi wind database gives an average wind speed of 5.7 metres/sec at 25 metres above ground level or 12.75 mph. Quite fast! As we learnt at school, the prevailing wind in the UK is from the south west.

Would these tall structures worry us? Perhaps, a little, until we realised that all of us will have to suffer some inconvenience if mankind is to survive even a few more generations. We are actually talking about the lifetimes of our children and grandchildren. To some, wind turbines could represent an eyesore; to others of us they have an aesthetic appeal, rather like Concorde, London's

Tower Bridge, the London Gherkin or the Clifton Suspension Bridge. The forest of antique windmills near Rotterdam in Holland is a world famous tourist attraction. Would the steady humming noise of the turbines be a nuisance? Surely not! As one who has lived on Royal Air Force bases with jet aircraft flying at all hours, after a while, one doesn't even notice such low-frequency noise.

So, this is perhaps what will become imperative within our lifetimes. So, how about an array of 6 750Kw wind turbines on the highest ground in Speen? The only energy source used in my house is electricity. Based on this household consumption, I estimate that three wind turbines of this size would probably meet the total electricity needs of the village of Speen. Another three would allow the sale of surplus electricity to the UK national grid - when inevitably this becomes possible. Perhaps this wind system could be coupled to a small pumped hydroelectricity system, as implemented par excellence at Dinorwig Power Station in Snowdonia, storing potential energy in the form of water to generate electricity when there is little wind. Water would be pumped uphill using a proportion of the electricity from the wind turbines when winds are strong, enabling hydro-electric power to be produced when winds are weak or non-existent.

The modified Google Earth satellite image - looking down on Speen from the South - depicts what we could expect, although the structures are not to scale and their locations are arbitrary.

Wildlife Watch By Peter Symonds

The key feature of the past few months has been the extremely mild weather conditions. To date we have only had one brief burst of winter weather. Temperatures have been much higher than normal causing some confusion amongst local wildlife. An over-wintering butterfly was noted in flight in the garden in January whilst birds are already singing as if Spring is already here. Numerous species are already looking at potential nest sites. In our own garden Blue Tits, Starlings and even our Great Spotted Woodpecker have been visiting nesting boxes looking for sites for the coming season.

Winter birds arrived in numbers, but so far few Redwings or Fieldfares have needed to venture into local gardens. Dick Seekins noted Bramblings in local woods before Christmas but to date they have not been seen in the middle of the village. Large flocks of Gulls and Corvids have been noted on the large high pastures around the village with Herring Gulls, Blackheaded Gulls, Crows and Jackdaws all present. Within our own garden a Grey Wagtail (as distinct from the usual Pied Wagtail) was an interesting recent record.

Elsewhere, in addition to our regular Red Kites, people have reported good numbers of Buzzards. Three were noted circling high over our garden in early February. Various people have also commented about our local Tawny Owls hunting in the heart of the village and being seen regularly by our early risers

The most interesting animal sightings mentioned to me relate to various Mustelids. This is the family that includes Weasels, Stoats, Mink, Polecats and Badgers. Identification of these

Badgers are very distinctive, identification of other species is made more difficult by escapes of non-native species such as Ferrets and Polecat-Ferret crosses, and the fact that many sightings are at dawn or dusk. A pure white animal recorded between the woods in Hampden Road last year was almost certainly an escaped Ferret. Native Stoats retain a black tip to the tail even during the height of winter. Polecat Ferrets have certainly been kept as pets in Speen in recent years, but sightings of true Polecats have increased in recent times. Polecats are larger than Ferrets and Stoats, and have a characteristic pale mask around their eyes in contrast to Mink, which have dark brown fur with a white patch to the chin and belly. Jeremy Symondson reported a probable record over towards Prestwood recently which was followed by a report of a possible pair seen in North Dean by the postman at the end of January. This was a daylight sighting whereas Polecats are predominantly nocturnal by nature. but these species certainly seem to be on the increase.

This November we and another friend took the incredible and scary step of jumping in the baptistry. It was autumn but Andy had warmed the water to a comfortable 'lobster' temperature.



Over the preceding year we had both been on a journey of discovery which led us to getting very wet in front of our families and friends. We were immensely touched at the efforts made and distances travelled by them to share our day - Ann Myers had even travelled from Moscow to be with us.

This time last year we were a long way from where we are now and through a gradual gentle process found our prejudices and preconceptions unfounded. It was something which we grew into as our understanding of the Christian faith increased. All our questions, no matter how basic or hostile, were welcome and some of the best discussions were in small groups over a mug of coffee.

In the final analysis we found that living the Christian life was not about guilt, fear or embarrassment but about friendship, community and support.

Having become convinced and reached the decision to follow Jesus, baptism became a very obvious step. It was simply a public expression of our faith; a very natural part of the journey – not scary at all (despite what we said in the first sentence!).
