

The land at Pye Corner

By the time you read this we hope to have completed the purchase of the overgrown triangle of land adjacent to the Chapel and bordered by Chapel Hill and Pye Lane. It was a surprise when the land became available. We had been working on plans to upgrade the hall to accommodate the growing number of adults and young people, so it seemed a sensible thing to try to acquire it.

Baptist churches are independent and network together, which means each church is responsible for its own finances, and I have been amazed by the generosity of so many folk who have made contributions to make the land purchase possible. Thank you very much. When we take ownership of the land one of the first things will be to gather together a working party to tidy it up, and then we can start to rethink and discuss with the community the how the land might be used to suit the needs of the growing congregation.

50-4-50 By Carolyn Gower

What Does fifty miles of Ridgeway Path; 4 days; 38 walkers; widows in Hyderabad, India; over 100 supporters and more than £5700 have in common?

This was how I celebrated my 50th birthday! Thank you everybody who joined me for some or all of the four day walk and thank you especially to everyone who contributed to the amazing total achieved. The idea behind the fund raising is to establish a refuge in Hyderabad, India for widows and women who are victims of domestic abuse.



The first day of the walk, Wednesday 14th February, five of us set off from Whitchurch Hall to walk to Nuffield. The boggy Thames path and steep climb up to Nuffield left Andy, Christine and I in no doubt that the next few days were going to be quite a challenge. A thirteen mile day... we were ready for our beds!!!!

Day two, nine of us gathered at Nuffield on a typical February day, to cover the rolling hills broken by woodland to Chinnor. The Fox and Hounds in Watlington was a welcome lunch break!

Day three was a glorious, bright day, twenty three of us were anticipating a steady stomp through the Chiltern Hills, whether for the whole day or just a part of it. We were not disappointed. The views were glorious as we wound our way from escarpment to escarpment between Chinnor and Wendover. Over such a variety of countryside the immediate company one walked with changed constantly—1 think everyone met and talked to everyone else.

By the fourth day those of us who were walking every day had settled into a new slower pace of life. It was quite a revelation, one small step at a time and so much distance could be covered. Our final day was Wendover to Ivinghoe Beacon. Thirteen of us formed the group, I had no idea Ivinghoe Beacon was so high--it seemed to have it's own freezing micro climate too!

So what now? The funds raised have been set aside by Agape Alive in India for the specific purpose of buying, building or renting appropriate premises for a community of women and children to live in safely. Hopefully a parallel project development micro business opportunities will develop alongside enabling them to become independent. This may be a small beginning but over time will really make a difference. Thank you for your support.

Surely with such an addition of luxury the Village Hall could shortly be renamed the North Dean Convention Centre.

Peter David Niven-Keen made a stirring acceptance speech as North Dean Academy Award Winner for Most Money Raised. Other notable performances were from Garry Passepartout Holmes for Most Pounds Lost and Peter Fix-Brownridge for Humongous Body Percentage Lost.

PLAYING FIELD IMPROVEMENTS AND MAINTENANCE

A 'Speen-Team' work party of 16 adults and 10 youngsters at the end of April reinstated the chain fence behind the DeWanium, installed a more substantial bollard barrier at the field entrance (the previous one was a magnet for reversing vehicles!), improved the cricket net, and did several other jobs. An outdoor (concrete) table tennis table is on order, to be sited at the top of the field.

RIDGLEY'S FIELD

The field has been made more accessible to children in accordance with Dan Ridgley's legacy conditions.

A kissing gate has been installed in place of the stile near Studridge Lane and the field is now not grazed and is

being left as a meadow with the minimum of cutting. We await rain to see what comes up! Your suggestions for the longer term for children's facilities are very welcome.

The 'Speen-Team' work party also reduced the hedge on the sharp corner of Moses Plat Lane to improve driver

visibility of young cyclists on the lane. A picnic table was installed and several maintenance items on the cycle track completed.

It is very sad that we have had problems of broken windows and smashed glass bottles at the Pavilion, and several times the new hedging that we planted at Ridgley's Field has been damaged. 


Speen Supporters Club

The experts promised us that global warming would produce extremes of weather and their predictions appear to be coming true. After a very wet start to the year, which has thankfully filled the aquifers again, the last four weeks have been exceptionally dry. Farmers enjoy the sun like everyone else but we were hoping for a little moisture to allow the




grass seed to germinate. You may have noticed that most of the grass fields have large brown patches in them where leatherjackets have eaten the roots and killed the plants. These patches were reseeded a month ago but nothing has yet grown. We are anticipating a similar problem when we sow the maize this week. You won't see any maize growing in the valley this year as we putting it in our distant fields, the home fields are already growing good crops of wheat.

The gales of the winter brought down an unusual number of trees, particularly in the hedgerows where branches have broken many of our fences. These have had to be repaired before we could turn the cattle out this spring. The wood must be cut up and burnt (we have to have a licence to do this now!) Talking of licences, we also have to have a licence to use old tyres as ballast on the silage pits. The preservation of grass to make good silage necessitates the removal of as much air as possible, hence we use tyres to anchor the polythene sheets. All our tyres have been on the farm for at least ten years and most of them have been here for thirty but we now need a licence to keep them !

You may have noticed sheep in our fields last winter. We follow a very old practice of having 'keepers'; these are sheep belonging to another farmer which graze our fields for the winter months; their small feet do not damage the wet ground We have to house the cattle as under similar conditions, their large feet turn grass into mud in no time. The sheep benefit because there is plenty of grass and our fields are sheep worm free; our grass benefits by being trimmed right back, all the old rank grass is eaten and the ground is evenly manured. Fortunately worms are only able to grow in one kind of host so sheep worms do not infect cattle and vice versa.

All our calves are wormed at least once a year, unfortunately the worm killers also kill other invertebrates which inhabit dung pats and soil, so like slug bait in the garden, one uses as little possible.

As the price of wheat has risen at last, many farmers are thinking now of growing more cereals for bio-fuels. This is probably a good option on fertile flat land such as in the Vale of Aylesbury but unless the price doubles we think you will be seeing grazing animals in North Dean for some time to come. The increase in cereal prices will make bread as well as dog, chicken, horse and cattle feed more expensive for all of us. No doubt there will soon be a national debate about how much land should be used for bio-fuels and how much for food !



I wish him many more years on the Parish Council; North Dean could not be better served.

Enduro Africa 2007

Spring is here and so is Hay fever Season!

ALLERGY FACTS

An estimated 18 million people suffer in the UK from allergies.








WILDLIFE WATCH by Peter Symonds



The key feature of the last report was various sightings of Polecats which were made in the vicinity. These have been reinforced by a further suspected sighting by Henry Lane on an early morning trip to the station on 22nd of February. On the Missenden Road beyond Great Hampden he briefly watched a suspected Polecat.

Other previous reports have also mentioned sightings of Roe Deer close to the village. On 25th February I briefly watched a handsome buck Roe Deer in the woods to the north of Speen. However the highlight of the quarter was on the 26th March when, for the first time ever, I was able to watch a pair of Roe Deer from our kitchen window. On this occasion the two does were present and whilst their visit lasted barely a minute I was able to grab a couple of photographs from a bedroom window.



Other less welcome mammals reported recently are single rats which have been seen in Studridge Lane and Abbotswood. Mentioning one of these sightings to a Speen resident he replied, "Oh that's nothing, we had five on our patio whilst we were having a dinner party".

Local ponds have been busy over the past couple of months. Frogs laid large quantities of spawn in our main pond from 8th to the 15th of March. This was quickly followed by Toad spawn from 9th March but both suffered from a renewed cold spell with frosts over 17th and 18th of March. The Toads continued to lay strings of spawn in early April which should now be quite safe from frosts. One major operation undertaken recently in Speen by parents, governors, teachers and children was the relocation of the school pond to make way for an extension to the building. The old pond was completely emptied and a new pond formed a short distance away. An elaborate operation involving sieving all of the pond water and mud enabled us save some 60 newts, 2 frogs and countless dragonfly larvae much to the delight of the children.

Wintering birds have now left the area. With conditions having remained relatively mild interesting sightings were limited. George Butler reports a single Brambling in his garden in late March whilst in our garden two Redpolls were noted during the cold snap in mid-March, along with the Mistle Thrushes and Bullfinches which were finishing the last of the Rowan berries. By early April Chiffehaffs and Blackcaps could be heard in College Plantation whilst further up Spring Coppice Lane Chaffinches and Yellowhammers were singing away. Many birds are now nesting. In our own garden Wrens, Blue Tits, Great Tits, Blackbirds and Hedge Sparrows are sitting on eggs whilst Robins in our neighbours porch have already fledged one brood. Nuthatches are collecting pond mud in our garden to cement around their nest hole in the woods. Overhead countless Red Kites and Buzzards can be seen in both villages with Sparrowhawks also noted regularly both circling and hunting low through the garden.






