New notice board and street sign at junction of Water Lane

In October the notice board was knocked down by a car. A new one was ordered and erected in late February. The old Water Lane sign could not be used in conjunction with the new notice board. The Parish Council have bought a replacement sign that will be installed shortly.

Speed Watch

In January 2022 Speen took delivery of its own MVAS – Movable Vehicle Activated Sign for warning vehicles they are exceeding the 30 mph limit and also adding

the number of offending vehicles to the data collected. Unfortunately, in February, along with others in the area, it was vandalised and the expensive battery stolen. The unit still has had to have an exterior body reinforcement added and the unit should be back in Speen by April, advising motorists to slow down. It will move around three locations in the village;

Dog Fouling Signage

A new anti-dog fouling sign was put up near the Chapel in February and the Parish Council is arranging with the Buckinghamshire Council's dog warden to visit Speen to discuss the putting up of further antidog fouling signage.



Chairmen's Report year to January 2023

This year was the first in the last 3 that we were able to complete a full calendar of events. There have been many young families moving into the village in that time and we really wanted to engage with them.

We made three organisational changes to help

Our first and most important task was succession planning and to recruit some new trustees, generally with children who use the fields. We hosted an open village bar night in the village hall at the end of April and presented The History and Service of Speen Playing Fields to our Community (which you can see on our website.) It was extremely well received as is evidenced by the fact that we now have 5 new Trustees in Richard Johnson, Nick Ridley, Julia Gaiter, Liz Patroe and Shaun Butler.

Secondly, as part of this process, we created an extensive database of villagers who could be called on to help with the maintenance of the fields. They were all emailed in accordance with data protection and asked if they were happy to become "Friends of the Fields." So we now have a Volunteer Army of over 250 people that we can call on for support. Unfortunately, the response from this Army to work parties has been poor and we are developing more targeted ways to get these brave citizens to help.

Our third organisational improvement was to create Roles and Responsibilities and to allocate them to the Trustees, trying to have 2 Trustees one old and one new working together, this is definitely working as evidenced by Duncan & Shaun on Field Maintenance, Liz and Jo on Communications.

In terms of projects, this was very much a year of maintenance and improvement of existing facilities and equipment.

When the old Hayter mower died at the beginning of the Spring, we set up a sub group to look at the various alternatives. The cost could well have been anything from £15,000 to £40,000, depending on the combination of mini tractors and cutting trailers. We also looked at outsourcing to a contractor, which would be more expensive than mowing in house. Duncan eventually found on eBay an identical machine to ours, but 9 years younger with far less use, which we bought for £2,500 and Keith Jones & I collected from Durham. This machine is working well and we have kept the old one for spare parts. We would like to thank the Parish Council for the grant of £1,000 towards this cost.

Other maintenance includes

- Completion of roundabout renovation £860
- A major upgrade of the Holmes Pavilion electrics, with many thanks to Andy at a cost of £1,700,
- Bike Park and half pipe repairs £1,000
- Replacing the baby swings and posts & sand for the sand pit £800
- Website update

Our main events were more successful than ever starting with Funday, which thanks to Matt was a great day out and fundraiser, which it wasn't supposed to be!

The draw also enjoyed record support thanks to Cristina and her team of collectors, and raises over 30% of our income.

Similarly, our Guy Fawkes celebration with the Menacing Missile Ship Moskva, was a huge success with a record attendance of over 600 people and record profits, thanks to Duncan, Shaun and all the builders plus the many helpers on the night. The PTA ran the BBQ & Bar and we were able to add a £500 donation to their profit on the night to help them buy new play equipment for the school. We are a small village and we believe that partnering other fundraising organisations is important. We were also able to invest to secure the next three year's supplies of fireworks.

There was again this year a group who objected to the environmental impact of the bonfire and we created an environmental sub-group, to produce an Environmental Statement for the Playing Fields. This will be available on our website **speenbucks.org.uk/ speen-groups/speen-playing-fields.**

We planted a new Christmas tree this year, which Duncan sourced and collected from Nuneaton on a flatbed truck, complete with its own earth, and it seems to have taken well to date. We also continued with our traditional Xmas Treecycling service and thanks to all who love bouncing on trees on a cold January morning.

Finally, we would like to pay our respects and appreciation to John Holmes, who was Chair of the Playing Fields for many years and was a major driving force for this Community. We owe him a huge debt and he is sorely missed.

It's hard to imagine, when on the day of writing this, it is snowing and bitter cold outside, we will soon be swapping our remaining winter stock back to spring and summer clothing, all of which has been in storage since last September.

By the time this edition of SNDN is printed and distributed, I'm certain that the Clothes Barn will be in a position to yet again receive your kind donations of clean, good quality items, ready for the coming summer season.

We had a busy end to the year with a range of fund-raising events in the village.

The **Christmas Market** in November was really successful, and the takings were up on 2021. We raised £3,186. Thank you to all the wonderful stallholders and to you shoppers in Speen who came and supported this event, which is as much a social occasion as it is a retail opportunity!

The Pub Quiz Night on Friday 2nd December hosted by Al Bowyer and Jill Rogerson was a very lively evening. Al and Jill had compiled great questions and Jill kept the teams to time with great skill and diplomacy. The homemade cottage pie and apple

crumble went down a treat and we raised £1,336.

Wrapping up the year we had the **Christmas Hamper** raffle that raised £827 and the **Carol Singing** £601 over two nights. Unfortunately, the weather was very harsh that week and one night was cancelled as the ice was treacherous. The carollers were truly stoic turning out in such freezing conditions.

Thank you to Dorothy Ratcliffe who requested that donations in her husband's name Harold "Hal" who died in November were made to Speen Helping Hospices.

Each of the four hospices have now received £4,500. This can only be achieved with your assistance so thank you for that. We know there are many competing demands for your support and we are very grateful for the help you give us. Please continue to do so, many families in our locality alone have valued the kindness and care their loved ones have received from the hospices.

On 15th March 2023, was the **Charity Golf Day** for SHH at Burnham Beeches Golf Club. This was the first golf event organised by Speen Helping Hospices. Butternut Squash, Chilli and Ginger Soup

Cooking time 35 minutes
Serves 6

- Heat the oil and butter in a saucepan, add the butternut squash, onion and garlic, then cover and cook gently for 5 minutes.
- Add the chilli and ginger, then cook for a further

- Add the hot stock, bring to the boil, then



Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil

50 g butter

1 large butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and diced

2 onions, diced

2 cloves garlic, crushed

1 red chilli, finely diced

2cm root ginger, peeled and chopped 900 ml hot vegetable stock

50g sachet creamed coconut (or a fifth of a 250 g pack and freeze the rest in 50g blocks)

To garnish: fresh coriander leaves

cover and simmer for 15-20 minutes until the butternut squash is soft.

- · Blend until smooth
- Reheat gently before adding the coconut cream. Season to taste, then serve garnished with a few coriander leaves.



John Holmes 10th August 1937 - 6th December 2022

John died early in December, just three months after the death of his wife, Gloria. Together they were involved across many activities within the community in Speen and the wider area and are greatly missed by their family, friends and villagers.

John achieved an engineering degree at Imperial College, London and worked initially at English Electric in Stafford, commissioning the electrical controls for large steel and paper mills. He and Gloria

were married in 1960 and they moved, after the arrival of their son, Tim, to Downley where Suzanne, their daughter, was born in 1964.

John became Chief Engineer for Quaker Oats where he designed food factories, moving jobs in 1976 to Amersham International where he organised laboratories for the manufacture of radioactive isotopes from Wales to Japan. His final role for 15 years before retirement was as regional property director at NHS Estates overseeing hospital modernisation and the construction of new offices.

The Holmes family moved to Speen in 1976, to Cherry Dell. John quickly became involved in community affairs; he helped form the Princes Risborough Rotary Club where he became President in 1980, continuing as its secretary until 2 years ago.

John was a very active participant in the Speen Community and helped organise the Speen Fete for many years. While Tim and Susie were clearing the house after his death, they found a very precise scale drawing marking exactly where each stall should go which demonstrated his meticulous attention to detail.

He also helped set up the Speen Festival with its amazing productions from 1999 – quickly becoming so successful that the organisers realised that they needed a covered space. So, in 2000, John bought a second-hand marquee and subsequently oversaw the purchase of the new one in 2010. The marquee has been the base for many happy village events - John had a knack of motivating the village chaps to help put the marquee up with the promise of a beer afterwards.

John was Chair of the Village Playing Fields Association for many years and he and Gloria were delighted when the Pavilion was named The Holmes Pavilion in



2021 in honour of their joint work in supporting the Playing Field, the Pavilion and the many events which took place there. John was also involved with various other community groups including the Save Our Pub group. Up until a month before he died, John was an active member of the men's discussion group which he had started.

John's other local interests included undertaking cycle rides for Buckinghamshire's

Historic Churches Trust, membership of the Chiltern Society, organising walks and group holidays for the Swallows (a group of friends) and enjoying watching Wormsley Cricket, to name a few.

The family say that they received a lovely letter of condolence that read:

"John was a man of great kindness with a sense of duty and service. Quite old-fashioned qualities that are so often hidden. Looking back, they showed up in his actions and achievements. I think he had that rare ability to have ideas and then actually instigate them and pull in others to help. It was his lovely nature that enabled him to do this."

Tim provided this quote from John's Life Story written by him in June 2020:

"I am very fortunate to have a loving wife and a close and supportive family, and many good friends. We live in a glorious location in lovely countryside in a very active village."

In their later years, John and Gloria were supported increasingly by Tim and Suzanne, their children, and continued to enjoy the company of their seven grandchildren of whom they were extremely proud. As a grandfather John loved to support the children's school sports and encouraged them in their studies and careers. He was always interested in what they were doing and considered in his advice.

The family say that John kept optimistic despite the debilitating nature of Parkinson's disease which had developed over the last three years. They feel that in a way it is a blessing that John is now reunited with Gloria, they have no doubt that the two of them are up there planning a range of projects together!

and she took the competition very seriously indeed. Both Mum and Dad were both foodies, loved to cook and host dinner parties.


Mum and Dad spent 25 happy years in the village during which time they made many friends and memories which Mum treasured to the end.

WILDLIFEWATCH

It is well known that Wild Boar have been well established in Kent and the Forest of Dean for many years and the distribution of wildlife changes fairly slowly. I was also aware of them in Oxfordshire in 2018. However, a reported sighting on the Bucks Bird Club website of three in Amersham on 9th November 2022 took me by surprise. I am not sure if this report has been verified or whether they were rare breed pigs that had escaped from captivity. If correct and they were to become established in the Chilterns they could pose a new challenge around the village with potential damage to gardens. Several residents have already encountered damage to their lawns from badgers this winter. Meanwhile a bold Muntjac has munched his way through pansies and daffodils right by people's front doors in Abbotswood.

Glis glis and rats continue to pose problems for villagers and this can result in people resorting to using poisons. Use of these outdoors should be avoided because the rodents do not die on the spot inside bait boxes. They wander off and die elsewhere and can then be taken by owls and kites which then die of secondary poisoning. I was alerted to a rather sick looking Tawny Owl in a village garden, which had been perched on a flower pot, for several days in November. I suspect that this bird had taken a poisoned rodent. Glis glis meanwhile will regularly use bird nesting boxes to rear their young in late summer. They are extremely good climbers and neither metal plates nor plastic tunnels at the entrance holes of the boxes deter them. Their usage is apparent from leaves inside the boxes when an annual clean is



beneath horizontal branches which have been used by birds and not at all by Glis, (so far)! I have produced five more of these boxes to extend the test this year.

Unusual and interesting local sightings over the winter include a Black Redstart in Prestwood in October; 23 Ravens at Lodge Hill, near Saunderton on 10th October, as well as 43 Golden Plovers in late November and over 360 Skylarks in December. A couple of Hawfinches were present around Hampden Church during December and early January. In Lacey Green some large flocks with 195 chaffinches and 125 Linnets benefitting from a winter feeding programme were noted during winter surveys which also turned up one Snipe and 3 uncommon Jack Snipe. From Speen I was able to report 3 sightings of Woodcock during December and January. My most unusual record however was a Grey Heron that smashed into our dining room window in early December. The juvenile bird had been approaching our goldfish pond near the back of the house when it was startled and mistook the trees reflected in the glass as its escape route.

Birds are now investigating potential nest sites. Mallard have returned to the village in some numbers whilst Red Kites are constructing a nest off Coleheath Bottom. Elsewhere Peregrine Falcons can regularly be seen in the centre of High Wycombe, on the eastern side of the tower on St Mary's church, where a nesting platform has been provided for them.

DARVILLS HILLFARM

Reconnecting with a small farm on Flowers Bottom Lane – Ghost ponds and mysterious watery goings on at Darvills Hill

Our free-ranging pigs, like most pigs have a thirst that is seemingly unquenchable. We have resolved this issue by providing them with a plumbed in water trough, but before this we did a daily top up of their water from the field tap. I would often leave the tap running while getting on with other jobs, as the trough could take some time to fill up. Invariably I would return to find the tap had already been mysteriously turned off. Could it be the ghostly hand of a farming ancestor who understands water is a precious resource?

This got me thinking about how livestock would have been watered on the farm before it was plumbed into the mains. The geography of the Chiltern plateau means there are no natural streams or rivers and historically water would be stored on farm in poetically named Dew ponds. A map from 1848 shows that our farm had a pond sited in one of our hay meadows, which in 2023 amounts to nothing more than a nettle filled dip in the ground. However,

its location makes perfect sense being some distance from the farmhouse's source of water and close to the surviving pond at the end of Turnip End.

Until recently ponds were an essential part of farm life, however the Wildlife and Wetlands Trust suggests that as many as 50% of farm ponds have been lost in the last 50 years as they are filled in to make room for more agriculture, leaving what are known as 'ghost' ponds like our one in the farmed landscape. Like many conventional farming practices this has contributed to a dramatic loss of biodiversity of plants, invertebrates and animals which are dependent on a healthy network of ponds for safe sanctuary, as they move through farmland habitats.

So, this Spring we will be carrying out some gentle excavation and regeneration of our pond to encourage the return of a 'wet' area to the farm for the benefit of nature, I'm also hoping our resident ghost will be content to see water conservation in action and worry less about keeping the tap turned off.

STUDRIDGE LANEPOND UPDATE

Studridge Lane pond is a long established, man-made dew pond that was probably a source of water for farm animals many years ago. Concerns about to the condition of the pond were first raised with the Lacey Green Parish Council, which owns the pond, nearly two and a half years ago. Some five years had elapsed with no maintenance work having been carried out and the vegetation had choked the pond. In conjunction with members of the village SEAG team numerous council meetings have been attended and proposals put forward to establish a proper management plan to improve the pond as a wildlife habitat and to give it a better appearance.

A plan has now been approved by the Parish Council for villagers to work in conjunction with a BBOWT (Bucks, Berks and Oxon Wildlife Trust) project leader who runs their "Rough around the Edges" scheme. This scheme seeks to improve small local wildlife sites with involvement from local community groups. One the key benefits of BBOWT involvement is that they have access to funding to support such schemes whilst the Parish Council will be funding the provision of any

skips required. Funds are now secure and these may be used to buy tools and pay for support from Chiltern Rangers with the more extensive clearance work that may be needed in due course. Insurance cover will also be available to village volunteers working under the guidance of the BBOWT leaders.

The agreed management plan should see 25% of the pond being cleared each year on a regular rotation to prevent the pond becoming choked with vegetation as has happened in the past. A more detailed survey of the wildlife present will be prepared by BBOWT later in the Spring.

It was hoped to carry out a 25% clearance operation earlier this year in January or February. However, by the time everything had been signed off the frogs had returned to the pond and spawn was noted on 23rd February so it has been decided to have a "tidy-up" session during March and then carry out a proper clearance in the late summer when the water level is very low. Hopefully a significant restoration of the pond is now not far off.



Going Green in Speen and North Dean

The case for an air source heat pump (ASHP) was fairly simple for us. In March 2022, during a particularly nasty cold snap, and just a day after I'd placed a large order of oil at nearly £1.30 a litre, our oil boiler developed a fatal fault. In fact, 16 years after the renovation work on our house, the entire heating system was on its last legs, including an ageing hot water cylinder and a crumbling oil tank. Thankfully, all the insulation we'd installed was in good shape.

We initially shopped around for an oil boiler replacement. However, I felt we could do better than this and unfortunately kept the family shivering for another six weeks while I built an enormous spreadsheet figuring out if an ASHP was right for us. As the quotes started to come in, it became apparent the cost of a new ASHP would actually be cheaper thanks to zero-VAT on renewables and a £5,000 grant from the Government's Boiler Replacement Scheme.

Thame-based Delta T Heating Engineers (previously Maxas) took two weeks to do a neat and tidy installation of the 16kW Samsung system. They also serviced and integrated our legacy solar water system. The oil tank was chopped up and taken away for recycling. Throughout the process, SEAG's Ben Wilde was on hand with lots of knowhow and personal experience.

Apart from a couple of very cold spells, we've had a mild winter, so it's fairly hard to know if the running costs are good, although they seem fairly comparable to oil. This makes sense. The ASHP and its back-to-front fridge technology uses just one unit of electrical energy to produce three to four units of heat energy. A look at the data shows 1kWh of electricity has historically been about four times more expensive than 1kWh of oil energy.

I was a little worried the ASHP wouldn't manage in the cold because we don't have underfloor heating. However, the house has been warm and cosy using mainly existing radiators plus four upgraded ones. The unit runs quietly most of the time but in extreme cold, you can certainly hear it working. My gut feel is that we might need a small supplementary heat source if temperatures fall below minus-8C.

What has been a real surprise is the amount of CO2 we've been able to save. On some nights, when the wind has been blowing hard on wind turbines around the UK, we've cut emissions by up to 98%. Otherwise, we estimate our heating CO2 emissions will fall by about 70% over the year and will continue to fall as more renewable electricity comes on stream.

Getting to know Speen Village Community

When she asked question, "How do you get to know the village's personality?" my reply was immediate. I almost said "go to the pub" until I realised that we do not have one. I was about to say, "stand outside the village shop" but it seemed more of a suggestion than any form of answer. She followed up her question with "I'm sure you agree that every village has a personality - I would just like to know a bit more about this one".

In retrospect, it was a very reasonable request. She has only been in the village six weeks then, but she got

me thinking about something else. Every village does have a personality. It is created over time, by occupation and by activity. It is formed by woods and hills, bottoms and ends and while you can read the clues in the hedgerows and the lanes, it is really hard to feel the rounded personality unless you know some of the history and heritage.

Speen is such a lovely place. Its working heritage runs back into the artisans of the furniture industry who built a hamlet in the hills to exploit the beech forests. Its agricultural history runs back centuries before that, and its archaeological history to the wonderful remains of the Grimms Dyke. But if you want to know something of the village's personality and then you need to turn to Clive Rainbow and his wonderful "SPEEN WW1 Casualties" the names of whom are taken from the war memorial at the Chapel. You can still hear their voices today in terms of accents and speech patterns around the neighbourhood. They reflect the personality of the village in the sense that their surnames, many of whom reflect trades and no doubt their humour, are still a part of our lives. We also can reflect that they gave their lives to preserve the way of life they



had lived here in Speen.

So, I told my new friend that this was a good starting point, and she agreed. But this is only a first step towards understanding where you live. Speen Heritage Group, keepers of the Speen archive, are always keen to support understanding local of who we are as well as where we are, have provided two more steps. I recommended to my new friend she buy a copy of the Speen Millennium Map and hang it in her lobby. I intimated that every time she put on her shoes, she might glance at it and think about where she was going

in the village in terms of what happened there. I think of it as the physical framework of a mental map of village life running back generations. If you want to get into more detail on parts of the village at various times, you always have "The Leaves of **Time"** to fall back upon. This is of course Speen's own history book but unlike many history books, it is elegantly written and not intimidatingly long. It is another way in which Speen is fortunate place. Written by Bob Johnston and Martin Stockley, it is a perfect example of what a village history should contain, as well as incorporating many clues to the elusive personality of a village. You cannot read it without agreeing with my questions: all villages have a culture, and all villages have a personality. You can find out a lot from the social events and from mixing with your neighbours, but if you want to step further into understanding where you live, these 3 steps give you a perfect platform upon which to build that knowledge.

Looking Ahead to Winter

The colder months of autumn and winter can be a difficult time for older people and for those living alone.

Especially if you live in rural areas like the Chiltern Hills. Although our countryside is beautiful, accessing the outdoors, popping into Princes Risborough or making the most of our lovely countryside surroundings is much more challenging in the colder weather and when the darker nights draw in.


